



## A Load of Old Rot

Martin & Mandy – Part 28

The last few articles have focused more on the history of St Bartholomew's and the people that have been involved with it – so this month we thought we'd bring you up to date with what we're actually doing behind that hoarding.

So, we appreciate that the Nave does not have a roof right now and we obviously need to do something about that – but first of all, after the delightful visit we had from the lead thieves, we need to deal with the roof of the tower. Now the friends of Layston did a top dollar job of patching the roof up and keeping most of the water out, but while we have all that scaffolding in place it's going to pay to send a little TLC in the direction of the roof, especially now the lead removal has left a gaping hole in it. The general plan was to consolidate the rafters that were loose, replace a couple that are clearly rotten, patch up the insulation and batons then replace the existing tiles. So from below you will see the oak sarking, above that will be a felt membrane, a super-duper space-tech insulation layer and then the original tiles. At this point we will pause to cut some bat holes.

We started by taking off the tiles which were then stacked carefully on the top lift of the scaffold so that we can see the felt underlay and batons that the friends put up there in the 1990s. We find Alan, Chris and Alf's graffiti on the batons from the last roof rebuild and we can now assess the state of the framework. Immediately life is not good, we could clearly see the bottom of the roof from the bell frame but now we can look down from above we have a couple or three issues to deal with. The first one is the roof plates. What are roof plates?' I hear you say and that's what I said as well! Apparently a roof plate is the bit of wood that sits on top of the walls of the tower and the whole roof's weight is borne by them. In the tower they are big bits of oak and there's four of them on each side of the tower. Well I say there are four of them - what I should say was there are meant to be four of them! We have about 30% of them intact and the rest have all rotted away where the rain has got at them. The outer parts of them have all gone, but lucky for us the inside parts (those visible from inside the bell chamber) are still intact and look great.

So the chaps set about cutting out the rotten roof plates and replacing them with new oak and strapping the new pieces to the existing pieces. The south rafter is also a bit under the weather, well I really meant 60% rotten, but the top 40% is actually rather fine. It's amazing how you can look at a piece of wood and think it's gone completely and then after a bit of scraping and brushing you discover that the core of the wood is actually in very good nick. So the rafter has all the rotten wood cut out and it's then spliced onto the new piece of oak and manoeuvred by about six people and a winch into place. A few more of the smaller rafters are replaced but in reality a lot fewer than we originally

planned for, so that's good. The little doorway out onto the roof is a bit of a surprise and again is more rotten than good – but the plan originally called for the door to be replaced anyhow, so we just fix the rotten parts. A bit more serious is the East-West tie beam – this, like the name suggests, is the bit of timber running from the east to west in the middle of the roof, and it's about 5m long and 400mm by 400mm, i.e. big.

Now we can look down from above, the east end of the beam has been soaked in water for years and so the top two thirds of the last 350mm of the beam

is basically not there – this is not good at all – we really don't want to change the beam because it's original to the building, it looks fab and it's a really nasty job to actually change... So we start with a lot of scraping to get rid of all the rotten wood and confirm

just how big the hole is that we need to fix. Back in the 1600s this would have been a real problem and the only solution would have been to change the beam. However, we now have technology on our side, and basically what we do is make up some side panels in oak that cosmetically look right and then fill the void where the rotten wood was with Araldite - we don't actually use Araldite, that would be silly! We use a wood repair epoxy that's a close cousin to Araldite, comes in a 7.5 litre bucket and brings tears to your eyes as you buy it! Sydney Opera House is apparently held together with the stuff so it must be good. Anyway, the results are rather excellent. From the

bell frame it's not possible to see the repair, the original beam is still in place and we have some structural integrity back in the roof at last. Check back next month for what happens to the rest of the roof and if you're confused like us about the hours that roofers work.

## ST MARY THE VIRGIN, WESTMILL £99,000 English Heritage Grant

The church of St Mary the Virgin, situated in the heart of the village of Westmill, is of Saxon origin and Grade II listed. Within the building are many fine architectural features which are worthy of preservation and protection.

Last May an investigation was carried out as to the state of the church roof. It was found to be in great need of repair, the amount of money required to carry out the repairs being in the region of £150,000. The last extensive works were carried out in 1870.

In June last year we applied to English Heritage (who administer funds on behalf of the Heritage Lottery Fund) for a grant and we are delighted to say that we have received an offer of £99,000 towards the necessary work to the roof. We are now able to commence Stage I of the grant which is the development plan. Stage II, the structural repair work, can commence once Stage I is complete.

Since the initial estimate last May, a more detailed costing has been calculated and



our current estimate for the cost of repairs is £171,000, so we are very pleased to have received this grant offer from the Heritage Lottery Fund via English Heritage and are very grateful for it. In January of 2011 the Friends of Westmill Church was formed and they have done a marvellous job, raising well over £35,000 to date. This level of support shows how much the community values the church, and the size of the grant shows that English Heritage was impressed by their support and enthusiasm

We still have a shortfall and will be continuing our fundraising efforts. ## BUNTINGFORD W.I.

Thanks to everyone who came along to our Spring Lunch in March and enjoyed some home-made soup and a mouth-watering selection of home-made cakes – and wasn't it a lovely Spring day!

Marlene McAndrew was the Speaker at our March meeting and her subject was the National Census and a House in Clerkenwell. The first part of Marlene's talk told us about events leading up to the National Census, starting with the first thorough survey of England in 1086, when William the Conqueror ordered the production of the Domesday Book. Although this painted a detailed picture of life in England at that time, it merely established the ownership of assets for the purposes of taxation. It was not until 1538 that, on the orders of Thomas Cromwell, Parish Registers came into being recording baptisms, marriages and deaths in each parish. The first Census Act was in 1801 and the ensuing censuses taken every 10 years have given us a far greater insight into our ancestors' lives. ### **Cancelling Regular Card Payment**

## I took out a payday loan. Now I've found my lender is taking money out of my account that I need to pay my rent. What can I do to stop this?

There's a common myth that once you've agreed to regular payments being made from your account, you have no power to stop them. This is not true.

When you give your credit or debit card details to a company and authorise them to take regular payments from your account, it is known as a 'recurring transaction' or 'continuous payment authority'. This is not the same as a direct debit.

To cancel a regular payment just phone your bank and tell them you are withdrawing your consent for further payments to be taken. You don't need to tell the company taking the payments or confirm your instructions in writing for your bank to stop payments. Your bank should stop making payments as soon as you tell them you have withdrawn your consent – regardless of whether you have also told your payday lender – and you can do this verbally.

If you have contacted your bank in time, and a payment is made after you have told it that you wish to stop the payment being taken from your account, it will be regarded as an unauthorised transaction and your bank must give you an immediate refund, and put the account back in the position it would have been if the payment had not been made. In other words, the bank must refund any interest and charges that were applied as a result of the payment being made.

## When I was a 'Mixed Infant' A childhood story of Layston School

My first day at school was in 1951. I had never left Mum before and was both excited and a little frightened, but having two older brothers at the school helped me to settle in quickly. My older brother Keith was very embarrassed at me having to sit next to him on the big boys' table at lunchtime because I was crying for some reason. I was teased about it many times in adulthood.

My first class teacher was Miss Anthony, a scary character who suffered from chilblains. We had a large open fire in the classroom and it was a task for us each to rub her legs in turn on cold days. The pretty little classroom had flowers hand-painted on the lower halves of the windows which changed with the seasons. I can see the daffodils and baby chicks in my mind's eye even now. I was to meet up with Miss Anthony many years later and was surprised that she still knew my name and asked after both my brothers.

After a year I was moved up to Mrs Corp's class next door. This was a much larger room and had a large coal burner with a big chimney, but was not as snug as class 1. Mrs Corp played the piano and was in charge of the school choir as well as the usual teaching. I sang my heart out for three years and loved every minute. On one occasion we went to a choir contest at Hertford Grammar, where my brother was a pupil. I can't remember how we did but I do remember singing 'Speed Bonny Boat' and one about a mermaid. I really liked Mrs Corp; though strict she was fair and always found time for that extra step.

My favourite subject was sums and I loved chanting the times tables. Pride of place, I was a school monitor, which meant I was allowed to share out the plasticine for art class and was allowed in the stationery cupboard. This was quite prestigious.

Each day a 'crocodile' of over 100 children, coated and booted, marched two-by-two from school to The Technical Institute (opposite the Post Office) for dinner, supervised by Mrs Clark and Mrs Paintman (we all called her Ada Paintpot). We were not supposed to talk but we all dragged our knuckles up the corrugated tin fence on Church Street – what a racket we made. The meals were very different then. Stodge was gratefully received. My absolute favourite was semolina. There was no choice of menu – you ate it or went hungry. Mrs Plumb was the cook and Mrs Bull was her assistant. How on earth did they cook for so many when everything was made in-house? We still have a lot to learn.

After eating we were allowed to look at donated comics for 15 minutes whilst our food went down and then marched back to school. The school day was extended to take this march into account. We did have some play time and often skipped four to a long rope or played tag. Then one long blow of the whistle and it was back to the classroom.

My third class was Mrs Jackson's. I knew her well, as she came from my home village and accompanied us little dears on the school bus. Oh my, was she strict – no messing in her class – but she was a great teacher. Her classroom was at the north end of the red brick building which remains today. One morning a week we had music lessons from the radio, joining in with our percussion instruments. We even had the famous opera singer Kathleen Ferrier come to the school to sing for us one day and I remember that she sang 'Blow the wind southerly'.

I kept my head down and it was soon time to go into Miss Davis's class. Miss Davis I best remember for a fabulous large green agate ring that she wore all the time and the many

different scarves she constantly wore over her cardigan. To my mind at that time I thought Miss Davis to be quite posh and here again a good teacher. I was moved up to Mr Jones's class early, which meant I left all my mates behind. Mr Jones was Welsh and an art teacher. Like his predecessor, Mr Neep, he decided to build a statue in the garden. Mr Neep's contribution was a dragon called Jasper, who sat under the apple tree in our rather large school garden. Mr Jones decided to make a pond with a shepherdess playing a recorder (he taught recorder as well as art). When the shepherdess had been covered in cement and the pond had set, I was given the afternoon off lessons to scrub the concrete to remove the lime which would stop the water plants growing. Sadly, I understand that the shepherdess has disappeared along with the garden plots. We had gardening lessons on a Friday with Mrs Berge and on a Friday afternoon the classes took it in turn to pick the many yellow pansies and take a bunch home for our Mums.

It was a bit daunting to move up and I remember when Mr Jones had an accident Mrs Whitaker took us for a while. For the first time I got into in trouble, for rolling a pencil across the desk, and received a slap with a ruler across my knuckles from Mrs Whitaker, but I learned a valuable lesson about paying attention. My favourite lesson with Mrs Whitaker was sewing and after the usual sampler I went on to hand-sew a red gingham skirt. Wow, I was so proud of myself! I remember it being on show at sports day. Years later I met Mrs Whitaker at Ward Freman School, where she had been teaching my son and I tackled her on the corporal punishment she meted out on my poor hand. She laughed but obviously didn't remember the incident.

Sports day was in the summer term and all parents were invited to watch their little darlings race up and down. The egg and spoon race raised many a laugh and the sack race was only bettered by the parent's sack race, especially if one of them fell over.

Well it was now time to face the dreaded 11+ and as the school was bursting at the seams the top class of 8 pupils sitting the exam were moved into Mrs Skip's office. Building was about to start on the new part of the school, so all my peers who were not taking the exam were sent along with their teachers to what is now Edwinstree School for their last two terms of the year. We were given brand new desks and were all extremely proud. We even polished our desks every week.

The one and only telephone at school was in Mrs Skip's office and one of our gang was allowed to phone up Mrs Plumb, the cook, with the number for lunch that day. I had never used a phone before and was really scared to ask the operator for 'Buntingford 248, this is 235'. Why do I remember that, I wonder? On February 6<sup>th</sup>, 1952, my brother Colin had the duty to phone Mrs Plumb advising her that lunches would not be required that day. Mrs Skip instructed Colin to say 'The King is dead. Long live the Queen'. We were all sent home early as the school was closed out of respect.

The site manager of the new school build was a Mr Diable and he came into our classroom twice a day to boil the kettle for the men's cuppa. Can you believe that? Mrs Skip, the headmistress, had an old baby milk tin painted green and filled with toffees. The toffees were awards for effort and good work. I was allowed to choose one after I helped look after two Italian children who had moved to the area. I will tell you that my nickname from Mr Jones was 'Mother Bullard' as I was always looking after the young ones. I was a bit of an old hen even at the tender age of 10.

The day had come. School as I had known it was now over and it was time to move to my second school. Well, that is another tale ...

## **Garden notes** from Church Farm Growers

Into April and the spring sowing schedule at Church Farm is already well under way. Back in January, we started off our tomatoes, peppers and aubergines for production in two of our polytunnels. Additional tomatoes will also be grown outdoors this year. February saw the sowing of an early crop of carrots under protection in polytunnel one, while in March the seed sowing programme for the new season began properly with seeds of all manner of produce for both indoor and field cropping.

April is the time for sowing, among many other things, crops that thrive in the midsummer sun and yield their bounty during the late summer or autumn. Such plants include sweetcorn, climbing french beans, and winter squash. Of course, these are usually grown separately in the garden, allotment or field, especially if a conventional crop rotation system is in use. However, they may also be grown side-by-side in the same plot, in a remarkable companionship known as the 'three sisters', or alternatively the 'pre-Columbian association'.

#### The 'three sisters'

This polyculture technique derives from the wisdom of various Native American tribes, for whom these crops were all essential staple foods. The technique was used for many centuries with little variation by diverse peoples throughout the North American continent. These people held forthright spriritual beliefs about the importance of these crops and their relationship with each other, with the land and with the people, but there are numerous purely practical aspects of their success as a companionship, not least the fact that up to 20 per cent increased aggregate yields can be achieved for similar areas of land than growing the crops separately, with lower expense of water and fertilizer.

The association involves planting the three crops together in such a way that they have a beneficial effect on each other. The corn provides a structure for the beans to climb up, removing the need for assemblages of poles or strings. The beans, coming as they do from the legume family of plants, fix atmospheric nitrogen in the soil and thereby help to provide essential fertility for all three sisters. The squashes sprawl over the ground and in spreading their large leaves they shade the soil, suppress weeds and conserve soil moisture. The three sisters complement each other as foods as well as growing plants, between them providing a balanced range of nutrients important for human health.

So why not give it a try in your own garden or allotment? To cultivate the three plants in this fashion, the soil they are to grow in will need to be in good heart in order to support these three hungry plants at once. Ideally it will have been well looked after for at least two seasons, with annual applications of manure or garden compost. Sow sweetcorn seeds about 30cm apart in blocks, not solitary rows, to help ensure pollination of the flowers. Or raise them as seedlings under protection in pots or modules to plant out in blocks later. When the young corn plants are 6 inches (15cm) tall, it is time to sow the beans, at 8 inch (20cm) spacings around the corn, and the squashes, at 2 feet (60cm) apart in the spaces between the corn/beans. An additional trowel of compost when planting the squashes would not go amiss. Water well, then stand back and prepare for

an abundant harvest in late summer and autumn. Oh, and by the way, it looks wonderful too.

At Church Farm we won't quite be following this technique on the large scale we work on, as our beans on their own currently form an important part of our conventional crop rotation plan. However, we do intend to intercrop sweetcorn and winter squash. For the sake of a little inconvenience regarding harvesting of the corn, the benefits in terms of yield per acre of land and aesthetic enjoyment should be great. I'm looking forward to it!

But I have noticed how much things have changed since the last London Olympiad in 1948. the so-named 'austerity games', while at the same time noticina how some things never change. I seem to remember the Arabs were about Israel kickina uр showing their flag at the opening ceremony, Russia was not even included, and the only former axis country invited was Italy. So even then politics and politicians couldn't resist the temptation to interfere

Most of the overseas competitors were housed in wooden huts whilst our team came by bus after work. The BBC was involved in the coverage in black and white, which was broadcast in-between the other programmes of the day and within limited hours. I don't seem to remember any 'Elf and Safety' being around and the White City track was still very basic. Clement Attlee was prime minister – that was when prime ministers were bald and were not 'personalities' like call-me Dave or the opportunist Tone. (It will be interesting to see how Blair wangles himself into the proceedings.) Attlee wished everybody a good games and fair weather, and then went back to running the country. I don't recall a single firework extravaganza at any point?

Meanwhile personalities and fellow travellers will be whisked about in chauffeur driven limos along special VIP lanes whilst the rest of us struggle and queue.

Who knows, perhaps the 2012 games will make us truly European and, like the Greek economy, finally bring us to our knees? Is that another Coke and a T shirt made in China? Just put it on the Barclaycard, you know it makes sense.

Thank goodness the town is holding its own games as we may see some real sport and fellowship. Now where did I put those old blue shorts from my schooldays? I don't think they had a wash since 1952! #### **Telephone 101 for non-emergencies**

While patrolling around Buntingford, I do notice people on mobile phones while driving. Also, seat belts are not always worn. It's often the case that people have pulled over into a parking space to grab a takeaway or quickly nip into a shop. I politely ask 'is there a reason why you are not wearing your seat belt?' and the vast majority respond that they simply forgot to put the seat belt on. Can I take this opportunity to remind people that seat belts are a safety device fitted as standard in modern cars and in most cases there is no reason why people should not be wearing them. Let's take advantage of this safety device. Even driving around town and sticking to the speed limit, accidents can and do happen. If you are not wearing a seat belt in a vehicle a £30 fine can be issued, unless you are medically unfit to wear a seat belt.

I would also like to remind drivers that using a mobile phone while driving is an offence. It may seem a harsh penalty to pay a £60 fine and have 3 points on your license for using a phone while driving. But there is an even harder and tougher penalty to pay if an accident occurs as a result of using a mobile phone while driving. If you need to use your phone for an emergency, pull over when it is safe to do so and park, as this is the best possible way to use your phone in a safe environment.
