

Firstly thank you for the Journal, I look forward to it most months, especially to read about Layston church. However, this month I feel I must write. The parcel scam reported in the article 'Parcel Scam – Don't be caught out' is in fact a hoax that was circulated by email on the internet. The origins of the hoax go back to a scam of 2005 and a 'service' that was shut down by the premium rate regulator at the end of that year. It is not physically possible for a premium rate number to charge you more than $\pounds 1.50$ a minute.

Symantec, Crimestoppers and other authorities never send out e-mails to warn people about specific scams. They have lists of what is true and what is real on their websites and people should be encouraged to check there if they receive an email like this one. Have a Voice – It will soon be now or never

We are very pleased to report that the national body 'Civic Voice' has had major input to the House of Commons Communities and Local Government Committee report on the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). The select committee concludes that :

- There is no conclusive evidence that the planning system is a barrier to economic development.
- Local Plans should be the centrepiece of the planning system.
- Sustainable development should embrace the needs of people, the economy and the environment in equal measure.
- Development should be guided by the principles of brownfield and town centre sites first and in exceptional cases there should be absolute protection for some town centres from out-of-town development.
- Local Authorities should include an allowance for 'windfall sites' when allocating land for housing development – including an allowance for these usually brownfield sites which cannot be planned for but which contribute significantly to housing land supply.

The Government is expected to publish the final NPPF in February 2012 and has promised it by the end of March. Buntingford Civic Society will be working to the above conclusions in our discussions with EHC Planning and with developers' representatives. Very shortly we will be meeting representatives engaged to develop the Sainsbury site. We understand that public meetings will also be held and we strongly recommend that Civic Society members and non-members alike take an active part in these events.

EHC have stated that the 'core strategy' for East Herts will be out for consultation by March. As we see from the Select Committee conclusions that local plans should be the centrepiece of planning, this gives a greater sense of urgency to the completion of the Town Plan. The aim should be bottom-up, not top-down!

Finally, it was a real joy to witness the Freman College Awards evening. A full house, enthusiastic and highly competent young people, a very entertaining speaker and the pleasure of seeing Chris Davies receive the Civic Society award for Community Service. Freman College is an outstanding asset to Buntingford.

CPRE Hertfordshire Village of the Year 2012: Could it be yours?

Hertfordshire's Village of the Year competition is in its 13th year and the organisers, CPRE Hertfordshire, hope it will be lucky for some as they celebrate and encourage village life. Entry packages go out at the beginning of February and the deadline for entry is Thursday 3rd May. Each entering village completes a form and receives a visit from the judges, which this year will be at the end of May.

Sponsored by Hertfordshire Community Foundation in association with Hertfordshire County Council, Hertfordshire Life and the Hertfordshire Mercury, the competition offers cash prizes and trophies for the Hertfordshire Villages of the Year East, North and West, with a total of £500 going to the overall CPRE Hertfordshire Village of the Year.

There are category prizes, too, for Environment and Community Life, and the judges give special awards to individuals who have made outstanding contributions to village life – the Peterkin Rosebowl for adults and the Dorothy Abel Smith Pewter Bowl for young people aged 11 to 18. There is also a prize – the Hertfordshire Mercury Rosebowl – for an outstanding Small Village.

With 186 Hertfordshire villages of all shapes and sizes – each with its own unique character – it's a pity that more don't enter the competition', says organiser Jo Simson. 'The villages which do seem to get such a buzz out of it'.

Take Hunsdon, the CPRE Hertfordshire Village of the Year in 2011. Writing in Hertfordshire Life's September 2011 issue, David Gibbs, Chairman of Hunsdon Parish Council, said: 'I would recommend those villages which have never entered the CPRE Hertfordshire competition to seriously consider doing so. But ... you have to start with a community which loves its village.'

The 2011 Village of the Year North winner was Pirton. This was the first major award for the village which has been entering since the competition began in 2000 to celebrate the Millennium. Organiser Dick Woodward says: 'The award is an acknowledgement of the time and energy contributed by many Pirton people who give of themselves for the benefit of the village. It's a village of just 1,300 residents, but over 40 organisations – all run by village people – are listed in St. Mary's Pirton Magazine. Entering the competition was a way of letting the world know what a wonderful village Pirton is.'

Standon & Puckeridge joined forces in 2011 to make their very first entry. Cllr Mark Acford was not keen at first: 'I was against it on the grounds it was all flower tubs and hanging baskets – but nothing was done to make the village look different from what it is day to day.' Because nothing needed to be done and the joint entrants were delighted to receive the Environment category award. They used the £150 prize money for a trophy cabinet for the villages!

Peter Graham Knight 1944 – 2011

I was very sorry to hear about the sudden death at Christmas of Peter Knight, who I got to know when I went to work in the Red House which Peter owned and also when I did a Profile of him in 2003.

He was born on the 4th February 1944 in Bishop's Stortford, where his parents ran the King's Arms pub. He played in the pub's darts team at the age of 8 and was also responsible for cooking Sunday lunch. His speciality was apple crumble and his father eventually said that if he did apple crumble one more time he would throw it at him!

Peter loved swimming and was the county diving champion at the age of 14. He joined the cubs and then the scouts and at the age of 18 he became the youngest qualified cub scout master. When he saw that the Boy Scouts of America organisation was offering opportunities for people to go to America and run their scout camps he applied and spent about four or five months there as a paid scout master for Chicago Scouts and teaching scout masters in New Mexico.

Soon after he returned from America he qualified as a quantity surveyor, working first for Herts County Council in Hertford. He subsequently qualified as a chartered loss adjuster and was accepted into the Academy of Experts. After working for others for a number of years, Peter decided to set up his own company, Knight & Co. He used to drive through Buntingford on his way to his office in Bedford and one day he noticed a 'For Sale' sign upon the impressive looking building known as The Red House in Buntingford High Street, parts of which date back to 1710. The building was fairly run down but Knight & Co. moved in in 1985. Peter organised some redecoration and refurbishment and installed an American pool table on the top floor (a vital piece of office equipment!).

Peter became well known in Buntingford. He said he must have 'let slip' that he had been involved in scouting and was soon snapped up by Buntingford Scouts and became Group Scout Master. This involved endless meetings, fundraising and organising camps for the boys. In 1996 Peter helped to set up a one-off family camp in the grounds of Little Court which was enjoyed not only by the local scouts but also by their parents.

He was encouraged to stand for the local Town Council and became a Councillor in 1995, where he served for 3 years, becoming Deputy Mayor at the end of his term. Whilst on the Council, he lent support to the small team of enthusiasts who were trying to set up the Buntingford Heritage Centre. When Peter stood down from the Council he was asked

by John Warren to become involved in the formation of the Buntingford Town Centre Management Team and was its Chairman for the inaugural year. The Team's slogan was: 'We don't mind who gets the credit as long as the job gets done!'

As if he didn't have enough to do, Peter decided to re-launch Lowestoft Porcelain in 2000. He had moved to Lowestoft with his family in 1995 and wanted to create jobs for talented local people, as well as resurrect a company that had existed some 200 years ago. Everything is hand-made and hand-painted and I treasure a beautiful little vase which Peter gave to me on my 60th birthday.

During the course of his working life Peter became an associate of the Chartered Insurance Institute and president of Bedford Insurance Institute on three occasions, as well as vice-president of the National Body. He was also president of the National Insurance Charities, gained Freedom of the City of London over 30 years ago and was Liveryman of three Worshipful Companies. He went on to become Master of the Worshipful Company of Constructors. Peter also supported the East London Charity 'Arts for All' as a trustee and involved supporter, as it was very dear to his heart.

The Red House has now been sold but Peter could still be seen occasionally walking up and down the High Street with his little dog, Luca. From the time he arrived in Buntingford he quickly became involved with the community and he generously gave his time to many groups and associations. His kindness, warmth and friendly smile will be remembered and missed by many.



'Captain Morgan was a Pirate Dude'

Mandy & Martin – Part 26

This is a line from one of Martin's favourite songs – he makes me listen to all sorts of weird music, so I'm sitting here with noise-cancelling headphones on trying to block it out so I can concentrate! Anyway, the link here is that we have a Captain in our records of the history of the church, although sadly not a pirate, but then you can't have everything. His name was Captain Roger Hale, who is recorded in nice neat writing as having been buried in the nave of Layston church in 1749. He was a very interesting character. Most people of that time would not have ventured much further than the next village, but our Captain sailed all round the world. He also lived in London, and this tells us two things about Captain Hale: firstly, he must have been quite a well-off individual, and secondly, there must be some history to tie him to this area.

So let's start with what we know of his life. We know he was born around 1685, as he is said to have been 64 years old when he died in June 1749, but his baptism is not registered in St Bartholomew's and I can find very little about his early life. It's not until 1725 that we meet up with him, by which time he is Chief Mate on the *Heathcote*, a ship with the East India Company (the picture below shows a typical East Indiaman).

The British East India Company – so named to distinguish it from British trade in the West Indies – was founded in 1599, mainly to counter Portuguese domination of the spice trade. As soon as the British set up trading settlements in India, however, they were impressed by the quality of the textiles they found there. These had normally been used as goods for barter with the spice producers of Indonesia. The painted and printed cottons, known as chintzes, were especially admired, as they had fast, bright colours superior to anything produced in Europe at that time. It was textiles, therefore, rather than spices which came to dominate trade between India and Britain.

The East India Company traded in many things – including spices, textiles, porcelain, furniture and tea – and Roger's home would have been filled with unusual items brought back from his travels. The ladies of Roger's acquaintance would no doubt have put the



fine silks, brocades and muslins that were brought back to good use by having them made into beautiful clothes to wear.

The East India Company also set up factories to produce goods to bring back to the UK. The import of such items prompted an article in the London Chronicle which complained that 'the East India Company should be laid under some immediate and salutary restraints, as nothing can justify our allowing any set of adventurers an exclusive right to prejudice any manufacture of the kingdom'. Clearly, the import of so many manufactured items - like this finely painted lady (right) - was threatening the livelihoods of workers back in Britain. Indeed imported china and porcelain were becoming so fashionable and accessible that 'the veriest tradesman's wife within the weekly bills, would look down upon herself a downright Tramontane, unless she had an urn or a Mandarin on her chimney-piece'. I have to say that 'Tramontane' threw me, as the definition of the time



is obscure. From research, I think it means 'Barbarian', so without such things within the home, one would be considered uncivilised! How different their world is to mine.

Up until now, while building his career as a mariner, Roger probably had not had much time to devote to finding a wife to build such a home with. It's not until he's in his forties that he marries the widow Catherine Henthorne two days after his return from India in December 1726. I'm guessing she was left to do most of the preparation for the wedding.

Almost immediately, Roger set sail again for the east. He was now on another ship, the *Prince William*, still as Chief Mate. This vessel was rated as 460-480 tons, with a crew of 92-115 men and 30 guns. By 1731 he had been transferred to another East India ship, the *Grantham*. The journal of the voyages of the *Grantham* was recorded by none other

than the chief mate – our Roger Hale.

Although he returned home at intervals in the following years, it appears that he spent most of his married life at sea. It is sad to think that is where he may have been when he received word that his

wife had passed away. Catherine was buried at St Bartholomew's Church, Layston, on the 29th July 1734, when the parish records (above) report her to be the wife of Mr Roger Hale of St Botolph's, Aldgate. Yet another link to Layston, when obviously they were London residents. Next month find out what became of our Captain – and why he ended up back in St Bartholomew's with his first wife, Catherine.

DID YOU HAVE A FAMILY CHRISTMAS?

Many of us will have spent much of the festive period visiting friends and family, particularly those with children. However, for some grandparents Christmas is an unwelcome reminder that they do not get to spend quality time with their grandchildren.

Losing contact with a grandchild causes great heartbreak for a grandparent. And sadly, almost 1 million grandparents are now in this position through no fault of their own. It may be that a child's parents have divorced or separated and the parent left with the main responsibility for childcare is not prepared to allow contact with the ex-spouse's or ex-partner's parents. Sometimes it may be that the grandparent's own child may be unable to arrange contact because they are physically or mentally incapable, or in the worst case scenario have died.

Whilst most of us recognise the important role played by grandparents in childcare, English law is more equivocal and does not confer an automatic right on a grandparent to have contact with their grandchild. The grandparent therefore relies heavily on the goodwill of the parent with care of the child to be allowed to see them. Otherwise they can be shut out of their grandchild's life. In such circumstances their only remedy may lie in going to Court which can be expensive not just in terms of money, but also time and heartache.

However, there are alternatives. The first step is for the grandparent to make contact with the parent caring for the child – either by speaking to them directly, or by writing a brief polite letter. They could make a number of important points:

- How much they miss seeing the grandchild and that the grandchild will also miss seeing them.
- How valuable a grandparent can be as an emotional and practical resource even as a free and trustworthy babysitter.
- The grandchild is being prevented from having a relationship with the family members representing half of their genetic origin. This is particularly important where there are language or cultural differences between the two sides of the child's family.
- Grandparents provide an additional source of affection and entertainment, particularly when the child is young.

It is important for contact to be established and retained – even if it is indirect contact, such as sending the grandchild brief letters, greetings cards, small presents and the occasional photograph. Sometimes it may help if a trusted relative, family friend, or perhaps a minister of religion acts as an intermediary. Sometimes it can help to discuss the situation with a specialist mediator or collaboratively trained lawyer. Mortgage Problems

I'm in deep trouble with my mortgage. Recently I saw an ad about exchange with delayed completion arrangements, which I thought could help, but my wife is worried it may cause us more problems than it solves. What should we do?

An **exchange with delayed completion** (EDC) arrangement may seem to offer a way out if you're in mortgage arrears, but you should think carefully before entering into something like this, as there could be risks involved.

An EDC arrangement is where you agree a sale price for your home with a prospective buyer. Contracts are exchanged and the prospective buyer typically pays you an agreed deposit at that time. Completion of the sale is then delayed, often for a few years.

The buyer may offer to take over payment of your mortgage, but the mortgage stays in your name until the sale completes. The buyer may also offer to take over insurance costs and to pay for any repairs to the property.

If you move out of your home and the buyer or their tenant moves in, the arrangement is not regulated by the FSA (Financial Services Authority). There may be a number of risks involved that you should be aware of. Your home could be at risk and you won't have access to complaints and compensation procedures if things go wrong.

As the mortgage remains in your name, you're still responsible for your home and the mortgage even if the prospective buyer takes over payments to the lender. If the buyer gets into financial difficulties, you'll be responsible for any debts or missed payments and you could lose your home. You could be breaking the terms of your mortgage agreement if you need your lender's permission first before going ahead with this type of arrangement. You could also be charged unreasonable fees that are not made clear at the outset.

Before going down the EDC road, get independent advice and explore other possible options for dealing with your mortgage problems that could be better for you and your family.
