I like the fact that for most of us there is nowhere in the town that can't be reached on foot, and I feel as safe walking home at midnight as at 4.00 in the afternoon. I like it when I know the names of the local police force, from the Sergeant to the PCSOs, and can exchange greetings and joke with them.

Public transport could be better – we always say Buntingford is 10 miles from everywhere and 12 from anywhere, but that is part of what gives it its charm. You don't have to know everyone's name, there are so many familiar faces you don't need to, we are a community, and as such we look after our own. Our list of clubs, societies and voluntary groups is second to none for a small town.

This is what has kept us here for the last 49 years! We can't preserve what we've got forever, but let change come gradually, so that we're not swamped.

#### Dear Christine

#### Proposed development in Buntingford

May I add my thoughts to the debate on proposed developments in Buntingford. I believe the issues may be far greater than has already been reported.

The following is a list sites submitted in the East Herts District Council [EHDC] 'Call for Sites' which I think better indicates the development pressure Buntingford may be under in the foreseeable future:

- 1. Land South of Owles Lane
- 2. Land to the rear of Snells Mead
- 3. Land off Longmead/Baldock Road (planning permission already granted)
- 4. Land to the East between the B1038 (Hare Street Road) and The Causeway (*Taylor Wimpey have approached Buntingford Town Council* [*BTC*] *with a proposal*)
- 5. Land to the West between Monks Walk and the bypass
- 6. Land on Aspenden Road opposite Watermill Industrial Estate
- 7. Former Sainsbury's Depot (identified as part industrial/part residential)
- 8. Land West of London Road
- 9. Land at Corneybury Farm (a developer has approached the BTC with a proposal)

All told some 90+ hectares. I believe EHDC planning policy was 40 houses per hectare so it would radically alter the town if only half of these were developed. Apparently details of sites are available from our Town Clerk, with site references and plans of area.

The proposed **Hare Street Road development** of 160 houses does seem to demonstrate some of the future pressures we could be under. This site alone could generate:

**TRAFFIC** – say two cars per household, each using Hare Street Road once a day, there and back, would generate 640 movements daily or 4,500 weekly or 230,000 annually.

**CHILDREN** – say two children per household could put another 340 children into our local schools. A recent report in The Mercury says that Freman College forecasts a shortfall of two form entries (FE) or 60 children, Edwinstree a shortfall of 0.5 FE (15 children) and Layston, Millfield & Ardley St Lawrence schools combined there is one FE available. Schools can be expanded but this takes time. What impact would this have on the education of our children already in the system?

There is also healthcare, public transport, policing, water and sewerage capacity to consider, and all this for a development of just 160 houses! Multiply that up by the available development land and you can see the potential issues we could be facing.

What can we do? Those attending the Civic Society AGM in April would have heard a presentation by Councillor Mike Carver who is responsible for strategic planning at EHDC. He appreciated the planning pressure Buntingford would be under and part of his advice was for BTC to publish a Town Plan and to take on expert professional help to formulate acceptable objections to development. He said that emotive objections such as *'we don't want it here'* would be disregarded by EHDC planning officers.

At last the Town Plan is coming together but pressure must be maintained to see that it is completed and presented to EHDC as soon as possible. The Town Council believes they

have enough experience in planning matters but have agreed to seek advice from an EHDC planning officer. With the possible volume of future planning applications I would suggest that the Chairman/Town Clerk can only do so much in addition to their other duties. Surely under the current circumstances it would do no harm for BTC to retain a planner who would be called on to advise as needed? Costs that could not be met out of contingency in annual budgets could come from council reserves, and therefore have no impact on the precept.

The Mercury reports that there is a local resident, Steve Baker, who is a planning manager for the Campaign to Protect Rural England. He is pressing BTC to take on professional planning advice. He is concerned that BTC seems intent on 'muddling along doing their own thing'. If the Town Council will not take his advice on board then I would suggest the Civic Society and Buntingford Action for Responsible Development (BARD) get together and consider employing an expert. Perhaps funded by the Civic Society and/or local fundraising? The Civic Society could then advise residents as to how they should word individual objections so these are accepted by EHDC planning officers as admissible objections.

Undoubtedly there is a need for more houses, but will these houses be affordable for the needy? I do appreciate that towns must develop but to be a healthy successful town we must have controlled development that keeps pace with the expansion of our infrastructure. If we are always playing catch-up then Buntingford will be a less pleasant place to live.

#### The problem with parking

With all the new residents that are going to be driving their cars around Buntingford, I fear that parking is going to be even more of a problem in the future than it is now, with potentially serious consequences for access to existing streets.

Last weekend the bin men were in the Paddock Road, Archers, Sunny Hill area. The bin lorries can go in straight lines and round easy corners, no problem. What they can't do is back round a corner when there are vehicles parked across the top of a junction or right up to the junction. The residents in Garden Road couldn't get their bins emptied until last Tuesday. The roadway is so congested that ambulances have difficulty getting through to Ashfords, and heaven help the local residents if there is ever a fire at Pig's Nose — there isn't room for one fire engine to get through, let alone the other three or four that have to attend a thatched house fire.

Understandably, everyone who has a car wants to park outside their own home. The problem is that they want to park exactly outside their own home and often there just isn't room, especially when the vehicle concerned is a van or a pick-up or even a small lorry. It is actually illegal to park on the pavement or too close up to a junction, and it is also illegal to park and obstruct other motorists' view of oncoming traffic.

Perhaps in all these plans that are being put forward for houses to be built in and around Buntingford, space — realistic space — could be built in for car parks, before there is an explosion of parking rage from the put-upon existing residents of our small streets.

BARD brings townspeople together to question new building developments – top of the list is the 160 house development proposed off Hare St Road.



In May dozens of Buntingford residents came together to discuss the creeping progress of building development in Buntingford. Out of our meeting came a resolution to come together under one banner – Buntingford Action for Responsible Development, or BARD for short.

#### Poorly-planned development will change the dynamic of the whole town:

- It would lead to extra pressure on schools, medical services and utilities (water, electricity, etc.).
- It would affect traffic congestion and road safety.
- It would not even meet local needs.
- It would change the very character of Buntingford.

So everyone who lives in and around Buntingford is affected.

#### BARD is a new way for the Buntingford community to make their opinions heard.

## **Clunch, Lime Plaster and Weathering Stones**

So, Simon the stonemason and his team have been busy and they tend to bring friends to the party – they brought Jon along for starters – Jon knows a thing or two about lime plaster. When I first talked to Jon and asked him about reference sites he said 'Windsor Castle and here's my Royal Warrant' – so our expectations were set pretty high.

The North and East wall of the Chancel had plaster and 'stuff' that was either just about to fall off, or was so rock hard that it did not move at all. This is what's causing all the damp inside the Chancel, so it was clear that something had to be done. Jon and his chaps turned up to strip back all the loose plasterwork and the core of the problem became immediately obvious. The bottom metre of the plaster is actually concrete which has prevented the walls from 'breathing' over the years, and hence the damp. So a larger drill is deployed and the concrete is removed. Now that might sound easy but it's not – the problem here is if you just attack the stuff then as the concrete pulls away it brings with it all the actual cobble infill and original plaster and that's just what we don't want to do, so that big drill needs to be used with extreme care!

You can see from the picture above of the southeast of the Chancel that the corner blockwork is just fine, the exposed rubble infill can be seen at the top, then at the bottom all the concrete before it was removed. Next came two layers of coarse lime plaster to bond to the rubble infill, and we are just letting that dry properly before applying the finishing layers.

In the picture to the right you can see the two layers of coarse plaster, but you can also see how the thin concrete layer has been carefully removed from the stonework window surround but left in the blank infill. This is because it's just too firmly attached to risk removing it, as it will almost certainly do more damage than good if we try.

We are using these two walls as a test case but, judging by the results so far, it is a bit obvious why Jon has Royal approval for his work.





So whilst Jon is tinkering around with lime plaster, Simon has been busy manufacturing the outer stonework for the triple windows on the south of the Nave and over the next few weeks these will get replaced. These two windows were the most coroded windows in the whole building and although we got away with only changing one piece of stone in the entire tower, on these two windows, after a lot of consideration, consultation and planning, we decided to change all the outer stonework back to the window line.

The inside stonework will be de-frassed like the tower and then a number of coats of shelter coat applied, which means we will hang on to the look and feel from the inside. We are using these two windows as a dry run for the main event, which is what to do with the West window in the Tower.

We managed to remove the corroded feramenta (that's metalwork to you and me) and the frame did not fall to pieces, but it was a close call.

The picture above is new jambs on the scaffold for the Nave triple windows ready to be installed.

For the buttress on the southeastern corner of the Nave, we decided in the end to change the two sets of weathering stones and leave the rest alone. These are the stones that take the brunt of any water falling onto the buttress, so it's really a bit of a no brainer – with them leaking the buttress really suffers, but with them changed we help it survive and manage to hang onto all the tudor bricks at the bottom.

Bits of concrete fall off and I contain myself to NOT give the remaining concrete a helping hand, it's not like the wall on the chancel and everybody is panicking about what happens if you remove concrete and how much of the original building comes away with it, so a delicate touch is the order of the day. The last picture on the right is the top weathering stones in position on the buttress.

## Garden notes from Church Farm Growers

### The Forest Garden

A forest garden is intended to mimic the structure of natural woodland, using 'layers' of plants of varying heights, all of which produce an edible harvest or other yield. The upper storey comprises full-size fruit and nut

trees, with understoreys of shrubs, herbaceous plants and ground cover. The forest garden might also accommodate edible roots, and climbers such as vines or beans.

Forest gardens are an ecological and low maintenance method of producing high yields from small areas of land. In the modern era the technique was first adopted in the West by Robert Hart in the early 1960s, but it is probably the oldest form of land use, beginning with prehistoric communities adapting established forests to exploit their useful products. Much of the Amazon rainforest is not utterly wild but shaped partly by human design and management. It is a testament to the resilience of forest gardening that it is successfully practised all over the world today, mostly in the tropics, as in the 'family orchards' of Mexico and the 'home gardens' of Kerala in India. These examples of forest gardening or 'agroforestry' inspired Hart to adapt the concept for temperate climes. He was particularly impressed with the Keralan home gardens, as he writes in his book, *Forest Gardening:* 

"[T]he Indian state of Kerala ... boasts no fewer than three and a half million forest gardens. As an example of the extraordinary productivity of some forest gardens, one plot of 0.12 hectares (0.3 acres) was found ... to have twenty-three young coconut palms, twelve cloves, fifty-six bananas, and forty-nine pineapples, with thirty pepper vines trained up its trees. In addition, the small-holder grew fodder for his house-cow."

#### The Seven-layer System

Robert Hart's pioneering system was derived from his observation that natural woodland can be divided into distinct levels. He used intercropping to develop a small orchard of apples and pears into an edible polyculture landscape consisting of the following layers:

- 1. 'Canopy layer' consisting of the original mature fruit trees.
- 2. 'Low-tree layer' of smaller nut and fruit trees on dwarfing root stocks.
- 3. 'Shrub layer' of fruit bushes such as currants and berries.
- 4. 'Herbaceous layer' of perennial vegetables and herbs.
- 5. 'Ground-cover layer' of edible plants that spread horizontally.
- 6. 'Rhizosphere' or 'underground' dimension of plants grown for their roots and tubers.
- 7. 'Vertical layer' of vines and climbers.

An important, perhaps revolutionary, feature of the seven-layer system was the plants Hart chose. Most traditional vegetable crops, such as carrots, are sun-loving and not well suited to the more shady forest system. So instead he elected shade-tolerant perennial vegetables, such as comfrey and beets, with strawberries among the ground cover.

The Church Farm Forest Garden is in an area between our Kitchen Garden and the main Beard's Oak vegetable field. It is still young and developing, but in years to come it will be an abundant source of food and a beautiful place for visitors to enjoy. ### **Employment and Support Allowance**

I have been too ill to work for some time and have been living on a sickness benefit called Employment and Support Allowance, but I have heard this has been stopped. It's already a real struggle to get by and I'm in no state to go back to work. What can I do?

If you have been getting contributory Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) – the form of ESA you should be getting if you paid the right amount of National Insurance contributions before you were ill – you may be affected by recent changes.

From 1st May this year, anyone in what is known as the Work-related Activity Group can only get contributory ESA for a maximum period of one year. Time spent in the Workrelated Activity Group before 1st May counts towards the year, so if you've already been getting it for a year and are in this Group, your contributory ESA will stop. Anyone in what is known as the Support Group, which is made up of people not expected to be able to work again at any time, is not be affected by this change.

If you have a condition which is getting worse, you may be able to go into the Support Group instead of being in the Work-related Activity Group. You should get in touch with Jobcentre Plus and give them evidence of your condition. Also, if you are terminally ill or are undergoing, recovering from, or likely to undergo certain kinds of cancer treatment, you will be in the Support Group. If you're in the Support Group, your contributory ESA is not time-limited.

If your contributory ESA stops, you may be able to get income-based ESA instead. This will depend on your income and savings, and any income and savings of your partner, if you have one. If you were receiving both contributory ESA and income-based ESA, you will get more income-based ESA to replace the contributory part.

The Jobcentre will write to you before your benefit stops, telling you what's happening and asking if you want to be considered for income-based ESA. You will have to provide details of your and your partner's income and savings promptly, so that the Jobcentre can transfer you to income-based ESA straightaway, if you can get it. You won't have to make a new claim for ESA or have more medical assessments because of this change.

If your money goes down because of these changes, you might be able to get more from other benefits, such as Housing or Council Tax Benefit, Pension Credit or tax credits.

Tim Turner of Sworders Auctioneers came along to our June meeting and spoke on the subject of 'Fakes and Forgeries'. He began by telling us that Sworders have been operating since 1782, one of the oldest auctioneer houses in Hertfordshire, then went on to say that people have been making fakes and forgeries for 2000 years.

Rembrandt was always a favourite to imitate and the Rembrandt Research Project was formed to authenticate his paintings. The problem is that Rembrandt had so many commissions he could not fulfil them all personally, so he would supervise some pictures while the donkey work was done by his pupils and assistants. Some modern artists resented the fact that works by the likes of Rembrandt, Constable or Turner could command thousands, even millions, of pounds. One such artist was Tom Keating, who decided to show the art establishment that he could paint just as well. He produced many fakes, set them in old frames and fooled people for years. Now, Tom Keating has become collectable in his own right and people are faking his paintings. Tim also told us of some elaborate fakes in the last 10 years. One family fooled experts with a rare Egyptian sculpture and also a terracotta statue of a fawn which they passed off as a Gauguin – it sold to an art institute in Chicago for £100,000.

Forgeries are still being produced, some of it with the help of modern technology – the colour photocopier has been an invaluable aid! Tim showed us a tapestry sampler which was displayed in a glass frame – we were just admiring the intricate stitching when he told us it was a colour photocopy of some wrapping paper!

Our next meeting is on **Thursday July 12**<sup>th</sup> at URC Hall at 7.45pm, when Mary Ellis will be talking about 'Sheets and Sausages'. The August meeting is on **Thursday 9**<sup>th</sup> – also 7.45pm – and Judy Howlett will be talking about the Air Ambulance. Visitors are very welcome. We also hope to see as many of you as possible at our **Coffee Morning** on **Friday 17**<sup>th</sup> **August** at the Community Garden, Baldock Road (in front of the Police Station) at 10.30am. Proceeds to Herts Air Ambulance.
