East Herts Councillor Mike Carver's presentation on how planning works today was most enlightening. The district council (East Herts) is now the supreme authority on what will get built and where, and it seems to me that all the old rules have been torn up. As I write, a meeting of local residents is being planned to discuss action against the proposals for the fields north of Hare Street Road. I would urge everyone interested in the shape of Buntingford to come to take a look at this and feed back comments and suggestions to the Town Council.

You may have heard in the news recently that several Air Ambulance services have been grounded due to faults in their helicopters. I am pleased to report that this does not affect our own service as the faults were solely with Eurocopter helicopters and the Essex & Herts Air Ambulance fly MD902 Explorers.

Finally, to end on a lighter note, it may not feel like summer yet but we are entering the summer fair and festival season. You will find lots of events advertised in the Journal this month. They are all raising money for good causes and offer an enjoyable day out. To kick off the month in style we have the Diamond Jubilee Street Party and Market on the 4th, quickly followed by the Buntylympics, then the Carnival towards the end of the month. I hope everyone is up for having fun!

The proposed developments at Hare Street Road and the Sainsbury's site are part of a general attack on Buntingford by developers. For those wishing to object to the proposals, it is not enough to say simply 'I don't like it'. The following points may help to inform the preparation of effective objections:

- follow the EHC website regarding the Local Plan and SLAA;
- ask Hertfordshire Highways to quantify the increase in traffic movements and car ownership, damage to road fabric, forecast accidents, noise levels and specific impact on residents:
- pursue other options, e.g. a business park/science park with higher grade jobs;
- what are the infrastructure consequences, e.g. for healthcare, education, public transport, policing, water supply and sewerage?
- what is the impact on the landscape of the town?
- respond to the Town Plan and seek a Neighbourhood Plan which could influence East Herts Council:
- keep Buntingford Council informed, but work with EHC where decisions are made;
- · keep Oliver Heald MP informed.

May I through the Buntingford Journal send out a plea to the residents of Buntingford? The Journal has helped me before in a search for information on my grandfather Sidney Daniels who was, going by his obituary, a high profile member of the community during his few years in Buntingford from 1925. He died there in 1932. I never knew him.

Against the background of Buntingford Council's draft Town Plan being made generally available, it is considered appropriate and helpful in appraising that plan to reprint the BCS vision of how Buntingford will develop by 2031. The BCS vision statement built on one proposed by East Herts Council and was originally produced by the Civic Society Executive Committee in November 2010 as part of its response to East Herts Council's Consultation on its 'Core Strategy Issues and Options Document'. The results of that consultation should influence the emerging East Herts Plan for the district.

CIVIC SOCIETY VISION FOR BUNTINGFORD TO 2031

Buntingford will function as a vibrant rural service centre and market town meeting the day-to-day needs of its residents and those living within the large rural hinterland of the northern part of East Herts. Accessibility to neighbouring towns and villages will have been improved.

The town centre will have been protected and enhanced, especially its range of small shops and the amount of open space increased. The former Sainsbury's Depot will have been redeveloped providing a mix of housing, employment and community uses.

Additional housing will be well connected to the town and encourage walking and cycling and have been provided to help meet the needs of local people and families wishing to move to the town. Growth will have been accommodated without compromising the setting of the town within the wider landscape.

New housing development will have been achieved that provides a mix of housing densities suiting the aspirations of a broad socio-economic group of people who will also be actively involved in determining the town's future development. Sufficient environmentally enhancing green space will have been allowed between new and established housing to avoid overcrowding and to help with the integration of new arrivals

In line with the above, a sports facility serving all ages within the town and the northern part of East Herts will have been developed on the Sainsbury site. Sufficient green space for allotments and burial ground will have been retained.

Planning for the area will be the responsibility of a district council that, on the basis of an agreed and approved local planning framework, upholds the vision against the pressure of developers.'





Birds and the Bees (and the Bats!)

Martin & Mandy - Part 30

We have mentioned the bats a couple of times in our last articles about the tower roof. We've had a lot of help from Southern Ecological Solutions regarding the bats – you may yet see them and the Causeway on the telly, as there was a film crew there from 'Britain's Empty Homes' doing a piece on how easy it is to work with an ecologist or bat inspector.

Well, anyone who has spoken to us about our experiences with bat inspectors will know that our original bat inspector (let's call him Mr Smith) was a complete nightmare. Mr Smith was difficult to contact, would not share information. lacked basic social skills like the ability to be polite, and treated us like the enemy, when all we wanted to do was learn about bats so that we could do the best job of ensuring that our new home was still able to be their home too. So, we had to replace Mr Smith for the sake of our sanity!

I contacted Stuart and Matt at Southern Ecological Solutions and they couldn't have been more different. Stuart has advised us in the build of the

garage to ensure that we are providing some alternative snoozing sites for the bats while all this commotion is going on – and for the future. He has also helped us with the design and construction of the tower roof to ensure that the cute little chaps have somewhere to stay. We don't have any rare bats on site, but even the common bats are protected so we need to make sure our little Pipistrelles and Brown long-eared bats are looked after. (The picture of the bats above was drawn by Richard Lewington, who kindly allowed us to use the picture for this article.)

So in the new garage there are specialised 'bat access tiles' which allow them to get into the roof space, roosting boxes in that roof space, 'bat bricks' which provide them with somewhere to hibernate. Also on the south gable end you will see something that's about the size of a small dustbin – this is also a roosting box (made out of a sort of concrete material – it was entertaining getting that up there). Because of Southern Ecological Solutions we will certainly have more bat roosting sites when we've finished than we did when we started!

They have also helped us with siting some interesting bird boxes which we're hoping will get populated. Stuart, who in an alternative life likes tree climbing, even managed to get an owl box near to the top of one of the trees in the northwest corner of the plot. It's right in the line of sight of the cctv camera in the weathervane and on full zoom the entrance to

the owl box is full screen in the picture, so we hope to be able to put some impressive pictures up on the website if we're lucky enough to attract an appropriate resident.

The owl box is huge in comparison to the little bird boxes put up elsewhere on the site, and has caused much interest to our feathered friends. I have been most amused by the little blue tits eyeing it up as a potential home – a little ambitious perhaps!

We have run into a whole pile of feathered inhabitants on the site whilst we've been working there, but a couple of really quite cool ones have been noticed. I had to look both of them up, but Mandy assured me that we had had one of them in our garden at home - then had to eat her words when she saw it: we have 'Great spotted woodpeckers' in our garden, but there is a 'Lesser spotted woodpecker' St Bartholomew's. at Apparently this is the smallest and least common of the three woodpeckers we have in England, and there's estimated to be less than 3000 breeding pairs in the whole of the country, so having seen Mrs Woodpecker we're keen to know if there's a Mr Woodpecker around too.

The other bird we've spotted is apparently much more common, but neither of us had ever seen one before – a 'Tree creeper'. This is a very small bird, very active and lively, with quite a piping song. The name must come from its habit of creeping up the trunk of the tree looking for insects in the bark, which it picks out with its tiny curved beak.

We are looking forward to receiving the final report from Southern Ecological Solutions – they have promised to include advice on how to look after and improve the site for the benefit of all the local wildlife, not just our lovely little bats. Mind you, bats don't have the prettiest faces in some people's view – someone I showed a picture to responded with 'Cor dear, only a mother could love that!'.

Finally this month – a personal request – could you have a dig through your old family photographs to see if you have any of the church hidden away? We have a few that people have kindly let us make copies of theirs – including one of a wedding that took place on a snowy day at St Bartholomew's – but we would love to see more, so get up in the loft and take a little trip down memory lane.

Nine Reasons to Make a Will

A large percentage of the population do not have a legally-binding will. Given the relatively low cost of having one professionally prepared, there really is no excuse not to have one. Here is a reminder of the reasons why we all need to make a will:

1. So you get to choose who benefits from your estate

- without a will, the intestacy rules apply
- if couples die together, there is a presumption that the younger survived the elder, so if the couple have no children everything goes to the younger's relatives
- without a will there is no provision for unmarried partners (i.e. cohabitees)

2. To ensure your wishes are binding

- the executors dealing with your will are required to comply with certain rules
- home-made wills need to be regarded with caution

3. To make sure the funeral arrangements you want are clear

- if you have never spoken about these arrangements it is still important to make your next of kin aware of your wishes as the funeral may have taken place before the will is even found and read

4. To have your say about your children

- you can appoint formal, legal guardians
- if you want someone to care for your children who would not usually be considered next of kin (i.e. not the surviving parent), you can explain your reasons

5. To safeguard your business

- you need to consider in advance tax points such as IHT (Inheritance Tax) relief
- you can decide who to leave as the majority shareholder although this would need to also be in accordance with any shareholders agreement

6. So you can give to charity

- many charities rely heavily on bequests
- these gifts are free of IHT

7. To enable you to make minor bequests

- the intestacy rules simply split your entire estate into percentages
- you may prefer to make individual bequests of personal items (e.g. jewellery)

8. So you can choose your own executors

- you can save money with less professional involvement if you appoint friends or relatives as your executors
- by naming your executors, it ensures that those you trust are left in charge of your estate
- you can avoid overburdening your next of kin (particularly if elderly, or if left with children to care for) as there is a presumption they will deal with the estate if no will

9. To take advantage of some tax planning

- getting professional advice on a will includes reviewing your IHT position
- you can consider making provision for paying the IHT

Garden notes from Church Farm Growers

Sunflowers can play a spectacular role in any garden, whether in a herbaceous border or vegetable plot. There are many varieties to choose from; aside from those with colossal heads atop 12-foot stems that are commonly grown, there are others of more diminutive stature, but offering a more interesting range of colour.

The sunflower is an annual plant, native to many parts of the Americas. Its name derives from the huge sun-shaped blooms it carries. It was once said that the heads of sunflowers turn slowly to track the sun during the passage of the day, but this is a misconception. Only the young plant can do this, the mature flower head generally faces east. However,

the belief in this feature yielded the name given to the sunflower in some European languages, such as *tournesol* in French, or *girasole* in Italian.

The head of a sunflower is not a single bloom, but rather an inflorescence of many individual flowers. Each flower will produce a single seed following pollination. The flowers and seeds are arranged in a complex pattern of intersecting spirals, which provides the most efficient possible grouping. Sunflowers most commonly grow to about 5–12ft (1.5–4m) in height, but some examples of 26ft (8m) have been recorded.

Originally cultivated in Central America more than 4000 years ago, where they often represented native sun-gods, sunflowers became widely grown in other parts of North America, before being brought back to Europe by explorers in the early 16th century. Apart from their ornamental qualities, they are grown for their nutritious seeds, which can also be pressed to produce a high-quality culinary oil. Lesser-known uses include tapping the sap to yield latex and using fibres from the stem to make paper, while the leaves make a good cattle fodder. The oil can be processed to make biodiesel, even after it has been used for cooking.

To grow sunflowers, it is best to sow the seeds indoors in 3-inch pots in April and May, though late sowings into June will do well also. Alternatively sow directly where they are to grow, once the risk of frost has passed, about 2 inches (5cm) deep, spaced according to the variety chosen. Sow or plant in fertile, well-drained soil in full sun. Keep watered and in a fortnight or so, the seeds should germinate. Protect from slugs and cold with bottle cloches until established, provide support by staking for tall cultivars, and stand back to admire that stunning display in late summer and autumn. Once the flowers have faded you can harvest the seeds by cutting the head, hanging it in a dry place until fully ripened, then carefully rub the seeds out. These can be grown next year, or toasted for a tasty addition to salads and stir-frys. A great plant for children to grow and learn by.

We're growing sunflowers here at Church Farm, Ardeley, and hoping to enjoy the seeds later in the year. If you'd like to get a closer look at the work we do on the farm, our horticulture team are out in the fields every day, there is free parking and the paths are always free to walk. 





Dancing in the Streets - Then and Now

Curly edged sandwiches and runny trifle! Who remembers the street parties of the Coronation 60 years ago? We were looking through the large box of family photographs from 1952 and we came across some from that famous day. One thing struck me (apart from the senior executive's hand after remarking 'who was that girl?') was the fact that all the photographs were completely devoid of men.

Delving deeper through the pile back to the V.E. Day street party, once again no men. Obviously there was a reason then, as many chaps were still away fighting in other theatres across the world, but where were they in 1952? The fact was in our case they were off building a land fit for heroes (so called) and my father, recently returned from the fray, was trying to hold down two jobs to put food on the table for his growing family. So once again it was left to the ladies, who as always rose to the challenge.



Of course, in the way that children are, we were not aware of the planning and struggle to give us a party like everybody else. As I recall, the weather was not brilliant and the actual day of the Coronation was interspersed with rain (well what should we expect? after all it was June). Nonetheless, in that 'can do' spirit, dining room tables and chairs were dragged onto the street from our recently built council houses. There was little danger of traffic, unless you counted Dixie Dean the milkman with his horse and cart, or Mr Pallet the baker in his tiny van. Bed sheets were brought into service as table cloths, and no doubt there were some critical remarks as to the crispness and whiteness of Mrs So-and-So's laundry techniques. 'She's a stranger to Sunlight', delivered in that manner so captured by the late Les Dawson.

The pride these women had in their homes was amazing, not like today where the latest kitchen and bathroom is *de riguer* and a life-style choice, but the external appearance of the home as very few people were invited into each others' houses. Every day the steps were washed and the paths swept with a stiff broom, then windows polished with newspaper (no special products then). Each week or so the red Cardinal paint/polish came out and the steps and window ledges were brought back to a bright red lustre.

The surrounding gardens were testament to the husband's horticultural prowess. (Wives and husbands? There's an old concept — where did that go?) All the gardens had box or privet hedges clipped sharp and the front lawns were surrounded by patriotic coloured flowers, red salvias and geraniums, blue lobelia and white alyssum.

Meanwhile bunting, now much used and rather tatty, was strung across the street, hoisted on high and tied by older boys who had shinned up the lamp posts ('Elf and Safety look away now).

As the afternoon lurched forward the mothers, aunts and grandmothers began to pile the long line of tables up the middle of the road with all sorts of delights, and occasionally the crack of hand on ear could be heard accompanied by 'I told you not to touch until later!'

Eventually the temptation was too great and the host of children converged on the tables, some in their Sunday best clothes and some in the remnants of the fancy dress left over from the morning's celebrations.

Many mugs failed to survive the day, but I am pleased to say that mine still holds pride of place in the shed alongside my old Davy Crocket hat.

Another thing I noticed about those old photographs is that both my wife's and mine show us both sitting at the end where the photograph was taken although we were at parties 50 miles apart. Was that just luck or did all the children move round so the photographer could sell a memory to cash strapped families?

Years passed and at the time of the Silver Jubilee our own children were treated to the same street party experience with all the families taking part in the organisation, this time the dads getting involved. We even had a float in the town carnival with all taking part in the spirit. Mugs and commemorative coins were distributed and a good time was had by all. I seem to remember the weather was a bit wet and windy again!

By the time of the Golden Jubilee we had it cracked and another road party was organised by the householders. This time the weather was brilliant and the now essential Bar-B-Q style blow-out was enjoyed together with live music.

So what will this Diamond celebration bring? Let us hope for a good time, lovely weather and wonderful memories for the children and for our Queen. Long May She Reign. Three Cheers!!!
