## **EDITOR'S LETTER**

This month there wasn't a single 'letter to the editor', I'm sad to say, but with everything that is going on in the town this year, I'm sure that is not a situation that is likely to crop up too often. The Buntylympics, planned for Sunday  $10^{th}$  June, promises to be fun – Jill Jones gives us a reminder of how to enter a team on page 20. And then, of course, there is the Carnival on Saturday  $23^{rd}$  June – application forms for stalls and for the Carnival parade are on pages 22 and 23.

Development of various sorts is likely to be an ongoing topic for debate this year. As reported in the Mercury, and also mentioned on page 10, Sainsbury's have appointed a specialist company, ProLogis, to come up with proposals for their old Buntingford site. More detailed information should be made public in April, with an opportunity for anyone in Buntingford to comment. Another new column makes its first appearance this month, replacing Brian Lemay's much-missed 'Gardening Year'. The growers at Church Farm, Ardeley, have offered to write a regular column of seasonal 'Garden Notes', which I hope gardeners out there will find interesting and useful.

Finally, wasn't it great to see some snow at last? Not everyone will agree, I know, but the pupils at Layston School did, as you will see on page 29. Now that we've had some winter, we can start looking forward to spring.

## Have a Voice – 'Things they are a-changing'

Recent editions of the Mercury have had good coverage of the consultation by ProLogis on the future of the Sainsbury site. The Civic Society with others is ambitious that the site could be developed into part of the Hertfordshire cluster of science parks, with all the attendant employment opportunities from managerial and professional through the technical and supportive skills to run such a park. It seems a backward step to redevelop the site as a distribution centre with its inherent access problems on Hertfordshire's very congested roads.

ProLogis say that after consultation with the Town Council, Chamber of Commerce and Civic Society there will be a public meeting. Please attend and participate, for the decision will impact on Buntingford for many years to come. It is hoped that soon a 'Neighbourhood Plan' will be in place with a clear vision of Buntingford through to 2031 and in the format required to inform East Herts Council of the expectations of the townsfolk and not developers.

The Civic Society AGM will be held 7:30pm on 24<sup>th</sup> April at Benson Hall. Readers of the Journal who are not members are as usual welcome, but be prepared as we will try to sign you up. The future of the Civic Society and continuation of its good work in the town depends entirely on active membership. There will be a keynote speaker and light refreshments will be served.

Time for a few gripes. The poor old River Rib is getting overloaded with cans, bottles and blue plastic bags – it looks dreadful and the ducks are not amused. Why do some members of our community have so little regard for the place where they live? The imposition of parking regulations is having major consequences with the dispersal of parked vehicles in inappropriate places. An increasing problem reported to the Town Council Traffic Action Group is vehicles parked on the very edge of junctions and restricting the view of traffic entering the road. The potential for a serious accident is there waiting to happen! And last, but not least, when will East Herts get Barratts to fulfil their commitment to build the traffic calming 'gateway' on London Road ? It was a requirement when planning approval was granted due to the increase in traffic volume on the estate and access to the main road.

Very pleased to see that Freman College did so well in the more demanding OFSTED inspection. Congratulations to Headteacher Helen Loughran, her team and the college students.

# Ideas and Opportunities

An occasional new column setting out some of the infrastructure and planning options facing Buntingford and the surrounding area.

## **ASPENDEN ROAD**

Aspenden Road is the only access to the Watermill Industrial Estate and is totally inadequate, dangerous even, for the volume and size of the traffic that uses it for access to the estate, to say nothing of the traffic to and from Aspenden. Any further development at Watermill will make this bad situation even worse.

Whilst other solutions are conceivable – such as a new access from the A10 bypass, for example; or another bridging point over the River Rib directly into Watermill from, say, near the junction with Fairfield – it is likely that the most practical and achievable solution is improvement of Aspenden Road itself. In particular, the section between Fairfield and the existing River Rib bridge is hardly wide enough for two cars to pass safely, especially on the unsighted bend.

We propose that Aspenden Road is widened from the edge of Fairfield to the bridge for better access to the Watermill Estate and also to the aggregate site, which is beyond the entrance to Watermill and also generates heavy truck traffic.

The narrow River Rib bridge currently has a 'Give way to oncoming traffic' sign. A better solution might be traffic lights with vehicle sensors. Or the bridge could be effectively widened, to allow two cars to pass, by eliminating the footpath from the north side and providing a pedestrian footbridge close to the

existing bridge. It would, however, still be one-way only for trucks on the bridge.

We understand that a request by local residents for a pedestrian crossing in Aspenden Road, near the junction with Fairfield, was turned down in the recent past. With the increase in traffic flows in Aspenden Road that decision may need to be revisited.

A traffic survey carried out over a 45-minute period in Aspenden Road, mid-week, mid-morning, in mid-December, counted 3 trucks and 77 movements of cars and vans.

#### Report for Traffic Action Group Clyde Millard & John Noades, January 2012



Bramble Hill Children's Centre is based in Mill Close in Buntingford and our main purpose is to offer access to services for children under 5 and their families.

Due to the popularity of Musical Minis, we have decided to run two sessions each Tuesday, at Seth Ward Community Centre during term time. We will still run the original session from 1:30 - 2:30 pm,



## 'Captain Morgan was a Pirate Dude' – Part 2

Following on from last month; in the year following his wife's death, Roger was promoted to Captain and he took the *Grantham* back to the East. He returned to England in 1738 where, after four years without a wife, he remarried. Francis Maynard and Captain Roger Hale were married on the 25<sup>th</sup> April, 1738, at St Dunstan in the West, London.

Our Captain Roger Hale was involved with the East India Company before they began meddling in the government of countries, before Clive of India, or the Boston Tea Party, and appears to have led a remarkably well travelled, but uneventful life, up until now.



Unfortunately in 1744, on what was to be Roger's final voyage, (the route of which you can see on this map from the time) the *Grantham* encountered a bad storm off the coast of Folkestone.

The ship was lost, so close to home, along with her entire cargo of pepper from the east. The Daily Advertiser of Saturday February 29th, 1744, follows: reports this as 'Yesterday Morning the East India Company receiv'd the disagreeable News. that the Grantham, Capt. Hale homeward-bound from Bengal and Bencoolen, was lost in the violent Storm last Tuesday Night off Folkstone. She is beat to Pieces, tho' the People, all but one Boy, had the good

Fortune to save their Lives. The Chief Mate lost one of his Eyes, in attempting to fire a Gun as a signal of Distress.' The *London Evening Post* states that two men were lost overboard, so perhaps that news had not been known when the *Daily Advertiser* was published. Roger retired following this devastating loss of both his ship and some of his crew. He passed away just a few years later.

His will leaves the majority of his fortune to his wife Frances, with money also going to his sister Elizabeth Furness and her daughter Sarah Furness. It appears that Roger had no children from either of his marriages, probably due to all that time spent at sea!

So there's what I know of Roger's history – but none of this explains why Frances chose to bury him with his first wife Catherine in Layston Church. For that we have to go back to the records we have already built up surrounding the family histories weaved through the ages surrounding St Bartholomew's.

So firstly let's look at Roger's will, which was transcribed some time ago when we were looking at other members of the family. The executors of his will were his wife Frances Hale and the 'Reverend John Maryon of White Rooden in Essex'. (One of the witnesses was 'Jno Vaughan' – I wonder if this Mr Vaughan has any links with Elizabeth Vaughan's family? Research for another time!)

As Frances was living in London, and the Rev John was in Essex, it still seems strange that Roger was buried in Layston, so far from his home and that of either of his executors.

Now comes the rather interesting part – in rechecking family names that have been researched as part of the Layston Memorial descendants search, I find something that is very intriguing and may provide the answers.

The only reference to the Hale surname is in the *History of Hertfordshire* by Chauncy, where he makes a chance mention of the name 'John Hale'. This John Hale married Mary Crouch, daughter of John Crouch and Margaret Johnson of Corneybury, Layston. Possibly the marriage date was 29<sup>th</sup> June, 1681, but that's unconfirmed (we like to find at least two sources of information before we accept something to be true). If this date is correct, Mary would have been at least 38 at the time of marriage and therefore not likely to have had many, if any, children. Although I can find no record of them having children, I believe that it's highly likely they had at least two – Roger Hale and, of course, his sister Elizabeth Hale, who went on to be the Elizabeth Furness mentioned in his will.

Mary Crouch married John Hale in 1681, as previously stated. I assumed that both Mary and John died relatively young and having rechecked the Parish Registers from Layston I find in 1705 'Mrs Mary Hale Widow of St James Westminster Middlesex was buried Nov 10'. Therefore John Hale had predeceased her – leaving the two Hale children, Elizabeth and Roger, alone in the world except for their mother's family in Layston.

It would also answer the question of why Rev John Maryon was one of the executors of Roger's will. The Reverend was married to Roger's cousin Margaret Crouch. As Mary

Crouch and John Hale (parents of Roger Hale and his sister Elizabeth) died early, the most likely family members to nurture the two children would have been the Crouch family in Layston – which would be why Roger was buried in St Bartholomew's Layston: it was his home church.

All this leads to only one conclusion – Captain Roger Hale was the greatgrandson of the original John Crouch whose memorial is in the Chancel!

I do love it when these bits of history all tie themselves together. With a bit of effort I could now work out the family link between Captain Roger Hale and a more famous seaman, who also has links with our little church – Admiral Horatio Nelson (right).



## Heating oil – how to make sure that the price you pay is the price you agreed

I use heating oil to heat my home and recently bought some more to get me to the end of winter. When the man came to deliver my oil, he charged me more than what was quoted. Are they allowed to do that?

No. Some oil suppliers might try to charge you a higher price than you agreed, perhaps because the market price of oil has gone up since your order, but they're not allowed to do that.

Once you have a contract with the supplier and have agreed a price, this price will normally be fixed. This applies even if the agreement was verbal and not written. You should refer them to your original agreement and only pay the price agreed. However, it could be difficult to prove that you agreed a lower price unless you have written evidence. So it is always a good idea to agree the price in writing when you make the order, even though this is not a legal requirement.

Make sure that this written information includes any other conditions on the price. For example, there might be a set time period during which the price is valid.

If you order your oil over the telephone or internet, this is distance selling. This means you are entitled to certain pieces of information in writing, such as the price you agreed and the date it will be delivered.

Have you considered joining an oil buying scheme or club? Enterprise Herts (a Community Interest Company) has formed a community based countywide oil buying syndicate which will enable you to reduce the cost of your heating oil each time you place an order through it. The scheme is backed by CDA for Herts, a long-established and well-respected Hertfordshire charity.

# **Garden notes** from Church Farm Growers

Welcome to the first in our new column of seasonal gardening tips and projects. To kick off we are focusing this month on ways to deal with garden and kitchen waste. At Church Farm we have the luxury of a relatively large amount of space in which to work and so we are currently using two methods. We've given here information on both of these, and we would also extend an invitation to anyone to visit the farm to find out more about them – or any of the work that we do.

## **Dealing with Garden and Kitchen Waste**

## Composting

Composting is a particular enthusiasm of mine, as it should be for any gardener, I believe. There is something deeply satisfying about the deliberate harnessing of natural processes to render nasty, smelly, organic materials into a dark, crumbly 'soil', teeming with life and everything that a growing plant needs. Given time, of course, everything that lives will return to the earth as something like garden compost. But a skilful gardener, when building a compost heap, knows what materials to use and how to combine them, in order to achieve the best and fastest results.

The stuff available to the composter comes as two types: 'greens' and 'browns'. The 'greens' consist of any humid organic material that has recently been alive. This includes all kitchen waste (avoid cooked stuff); non-woody garden refuse, such as grass cuttings and weeds (except roots of perennials and anything that has set seed): manures of herbivorous animals and poultry. available; and recently removed crop residues from the garden or allotment. The 'browns' are any older and dryer

ingredients, such as straw, hay, shredded paper and cardboard.

Building a good compost heap entails making alternate layers of these 'greens' and 'browns', thereby helping to generate the correct balance of carbon and nitrogen,

and keep a good quantity of air trapped in the structure of the heap. This will ensure that the conditions favour aerobic bacteria – bugs that need oxygen in order to function. These critters break down the compost rapidly and produce a surprising level of heat in the process, which helps to destroy any plant pathogens or weed seeds that might have got into the mix. A compost pile made in this fashion will begin to rot down very quickly, and you will notice it collapse over a couple of weeks (see the before and after pictures, left). Thereafter, regular turning will re-aerate the heap and hasten the reduction of all that stuff into something resembling malt loaf. It is a magical transformation, and there is no better soil improver or plant food than well made garden compost. Happy composting!

### **Worm Farming**

We're also working on breeding worms here with the view to feeding them to our chickens. Worms are a valuable source of protein, and the resulting 'vermicompost' or 'Black Gold' in which the worms live can be used to help vegetables to grow in the spring.

In the wild, some worms eat dead plant material that is full of bacteria and fungi, and also particles of soil containing other small living organisms. All these things are mixed up in the belly of the worm, and what comes out the other end is a rich source of beneficial microbial life. This improves soil structure and texture, makes nutrients available to plants, and improves disease resistance.

In our worm farm we use food waste that decomposes, and the worms eat the decayed matter, which is teeming with useful bacteria. Worm farms are an ideal way of recycling food waste all year round, with the advantages of producing free fertiliser and chicken food (or fishing bait if you prefer). There are various species of worms, distinct from the common garden earthworm (Lumbricus terrestris), which are suited to worm farming, such as the tiger worm, the European nightcrawler and the red wiggler. So why not set up your own worm farm to recycle your kitchen and garden waste, and enhance the health of your soil in the process.
