EDITOR'S LETTER

Well, this has certainly been an eventful couple of weeks in Buntingford. Following weeks of rumour, developers Taylor-Wimpey finally unveiled their plans for the field north of Hare Street Road, backing onto Archers and Sunny Hill. The exhibition was very well attended, as was the Town Meeting the next evening. As a resident of Hare Street Road, living directly opposite the proposed development, I can't pretend to be pleased by the plans, and to judge by the general opinions expressed at the Town Meeting, I am not alone. Perhaps of greatest concern is the lack of an agreed town plan to guide future development, which it is strongly suspected leaves Buntingford vulnerable to speculative development nodded through by a district council keen to fulfil its new housing quota.

Not all voices were opposed, however. In fact, one person spoke with enthusiasm of potentially 1,000 new homes in Buntingford over the next decade or so. Surely, if that is what's in store then it must be properly planned for in terms of the provision of schools, doctors and other services. Another major cause for concern is the ever-rising level of traffic on the town's roads and the need for parking. Baldock and Hare Street roads barely cope with the amount of traffic that uses them today. In the longer term should something be done to divert east-west through-traffic from the town?

Still on the subject of development, coming up very shortly, on 1st May, is another public exhibition – this time concerning the old Sainsbury's site and proposals to redevelop it as a new distribution centre, potentially bringing more work opportunities into Buntingford. I do hope that putting this exhibition on at The Bury, rather than in the town centre, doesn't affect turnout, as the proposals will potentially affect us all. If you have an opinion on these or any other developments in and around Buntingford and the future shape of our town – and I'm sure most of you do – I would love to hear it. The letters page awaits your views.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who phoned or wrote to me this month updating the What's On and Diary sections. I do depend on readers to keep me straight on these — and indeed for everything else that goes into the Journal. So if you have an article, event, experience or opinion to share, please do get in touch.

Last Bit of the Roof

Martin & Mandy - Part 29

Now we have the roof sorted we need to set about rebuilding the covering. The first thing that goes on is oak sarking boards. St John's in Cottered has this kind of roof treatment and it looks a million times better than roofing felt, besides which the last time I looked felt had not been invented in the 1600s. Next we have a layer of WBP - WBP stands for Weather & Boil Proof - I don't think there's much chance of it boiling up there but there's certainly plenty of weather! This does not look as nice as the oak sarking but protects us from the elements. Next we need counter batons to hold it all together; these run up and down the roof and produce an air gap between the sarking and the next layer, which is a mad space age insulation material. This has the same insulation properties as the fibre wool in your loft, but instead of being 250mm thick this stuff is only 10mm. Then we have another layer of counter batons and a layer of good old roofing felt. Finally the last batons go on which are horizontal ones and give us something to hang those tiles on that have been sitting on the scaffold all this time.

So we now have a roof in place and we have fab insulation and two air gaps that bats can snooze in

and six bat holes that let them go all the way through from the outside world to the bell chamber roof. In one of the air gaps we have a 25mm plastic tube that allows me to get a cable from the bell chamber to the top of the roof and then up into the Hertfordshire spike - the idea here is to get a CCTV camera into the weathervane. The spike really was rotten through and through, so this has been rebuilt in oak, wrapped in sarking then had a plate put on the very top of it for the weathervane. After the lead theft we put a camera up at the top of the scaffold so we could see what was going on day and night, and one thing we discovered is that roofers are a mysterious lot - they turn up and wander around for hours on end looking as though they are doing nothing at all, just looking at things and measuring stuff. Then there's a burst of activity and if you happen to miss it you look back at the camera and half the roof has been finished off! The lead workers are even more fascinating - they spend hours banging away with the leadwork, but when you visit at the weekend and go and look at their handiwork it really is a craft worth attention. One weekend when I visited, the top of the roof was just about finished but nothing had been done to the spike and you could see all the different layers of materials that had been used to complete the work. The following Monday there was lots of discussion between all the builders about how to transition from the roof to the spike and make the leadwork blend across that part of the roof. The end result that you can now see from the ground is certainly worth all the effort, but it's not a quick process.

Anyway, we have a new weathervane design which has now gone through listed building consent. This is the

same kind of size as the original Friends of Layston one, but has a ball below the vane itself, just like the one on St Richard's Church in Buntingford. Inside that ball is a high-tech bit of CCTV technology which will allow us to do some heavy duty wildlife photography and some nifty burglar recognition!

The top of the weathervane has a beekeeper and a beehive along with a cat, all perched along the top. Mandy has been instrumental in choosing and tweaking the design for the weathervane along with doing all the gilding. I'm afraid that Alan's cap from his can of Cossack hair spray from the 80s that has spent years keeping the water off the bearing at the top of the old weathervane has had to go! It was very difficult to get the metalwork and the technology to play nicely together. I nearly gave up on it as I was trying to get the whole lot mounted on top of the spike whilst connecting the CCTV camera to the cables. The camera is quite tricky, it has a zoom lens on it and a motor drive that lets us move it around at will. It can track movement and see at night - I hope it never goes wrong because getting to it will be a nightmare!

The last thing to happen before the bank holiday weekend and the removal of the scaffold was a coat of 'Smart Water' for all the metal on the tower. This seeps into any metal it's painted on and leaves a DNA fingerprint behind – the idea here is that the lead is much easier to trace in the

case of theft, and with signs up thieves should be deterred. Let's hope it does the trick.

THE BANK OF MUM AND DAD

With the property market in turmoil, many buyers, particularly first-time buyers, are turning to their family for financial assistance. Whilst property prices have fallen, or remained fairly static, over the last few years so have salaries, and banks are increasingly concerned about lending large sums of money. This leaves many people finding it hard to raise sufficient funds to get on the property ladder.

One particular problem is raising the **cash deposit** needed, as the banks no longer offer 95 per cent loan-to-value mortgages (*see below). First-time buyers are often left with no option but to ask their parents to lend them this cash deposit, and often parents readily agree. Unfortunately, this is sometimes done in a casual fashion with no proper consideration of if, and when, those monies should be repaid. More importantly, if the son or daughter buys jointly with a partner, who repays the loan if the couple split up? And how much do the parents get back if the property is sold?

If there is no formal documentation on the loan, the property will usually be registered with the **Land Registry** as being held legally in the joint names of the child and their partner. There will be no mention of the parents, or the money they put in. This means the parents would not necessarily be aware if the child and partner decided to sell, or remortgage for a higher sum. This puts the parents in a precarious position. Further, if the child and partner separate, there may well be a presumption that the net proceeds should be divided equally between them. The child is then left with the sole burden of repaying the 'loan' to his or her parents if their ex-partner maintains it was a gift.

Matters become much clearer if the intention of everyone at the time the property is purchased is set out for everyone to see. The easiest and safest way to do this is for all the relevant parties to enter into a **declaration of trust.** This does not need to be a long document, or cost a lot of money. It should simply clarify the main points:

- Whose name(s) will be on the land registry records as the legal owner(s)?
- Should there be a restriction entered on the Land Registry records to protect any other party who has an interest in the property?
- Set out who contributed what sums to the purchase price of the property and specifically state whether it is a loan or gift, and whether any interest is payable.
- Clarify how the net sale proceeds are to be divided if the property is sold.

This simple document can save months of distress and thousands of pounds in legal costs if there is a dispute. Tax Credit Changes

My husband works in a local newsagent 14 hours a week and I work eight hours a week in a local nursery, bringing our joint number of hours to 22. We have one child. We have both tried to increase our hours with our respective employers, but they have no more hours available. Are we correct in thinking that if we don't pick up extra hours from somewhere that we will lose our Working Tax Credit?

Quite possibly, yes. Since 6 April, couples who have at least one child and get Working Tax Credit will normally have to work at least 24 hours a week between them, instead of just 16 hours required previously, to qualify for any payment. One of you must also work at least 16 hours a week. However, there are exceptions to the new 24-hour requirement. For example, if you or your partner are disabled in certain circumstances, are in hospital or over 60, you do not have to work 24 hours between you. Other changes that came into effect on 6th April 2012 include the following:

- If your income goes down by £2,500 or less in a tax year, this will not be taken into account until the next tax year. If it goes down by more than £2,500, HMRC will re-calculate your tax credits but will ignore the first £2,500. You will still have to wait till the next tax year for any extra tax credits that you might be due as a result of your income going down. However, you should always tell HMRC about any changes in your income straightaway.
- If you make a new claim, or have a change in your circumstances which would mean your payments should go up, the extra money you'll get will only be backdated by one month instead of three months.
- The '50 plus element' of Working Tax Credit has ceased. Nobody will be able to claim this after 6 April 2012.

These changes mean you may stop getting your tax credits if your income is too high, or you may have to work extra hours to continue getting the tax credits. However, if you have a change in your circumstances that means you may get extra tax credits – for example, if your income goes down by more than £2,500 in the new tax year, or if you have a new baby – you should tell HMRC straightaway. This may mean you could still get your tax credits after 6 April.

Koh Samui – 'Heaven On Earth'

Backpackers discovered Koh Samui in the early 1970s, when the island was simply called 'heaven on earth'. The place has such an rich variety of beaches, bays and coves that it can seem like several islands in one. Koh Samui is an island in the Gulf of Thailand, some 700km and one hour's fliaht time south Bangkok and about 80km from the eastern coastline of Southern Thailand. It is the third largest island in Thailand after Phuket and Koh Chang.

Over the last 20 years, the main industries of coconut farming and fishing have given way to tourism and many of the small cheap beach huts favoured by backpackers have been replaced by luxury resorts. Fortunately, local regulations limit the height of resorts on the beach, so there are none of the high rise hotels that are seen in Phuket or Pattaya. The primary beaches of Lamai and Chaweng boast stunning white sand, luxury resorts, spas, water sports and restaurants to suit every budget.

Although the island is famous for its beaches, inland you can discover rain forest, dramatic waterfalls and beautiful mountains with spectacular views. An elephant trek through the jungle is one way of visiting the interior, or zip-wiring across the forest canopy is a must for the more adventurous visitor. The best way to see the island in its entirety is by small motorbike. For £6 a day you can circumnavigate the island in a couple of hours.

Wat Phra Yai is Samui's 'Temple of the Big Buddha', with a 12-metre-tall Buddha image. Built in 1972, this iconic temple sits on a little island connected to the main island by a small bridge. The temple grounds house a centre for meditation, another draw for more spiritual visitors to Koh Samui. When visiting any temple in Thailand, it's important to follow the standard rules of dress and etiquette: wear long trousers and sleeves, remove your shoes before entering the actual temple, and definitely no beachwear.

It's still easy to find quiet, unspoilt beaches in Koh Samui. We stayed at Samrong Bay in the north of the island and had the beach virtually to ourselves. This really was one of Koh Samui's hidden gems. We rented a four bedroomed villa, as there were eight of us. The spacious Thai style villa had en-suite facilities in all bedrooms, with a central lounge/diner and kitchen, a daily maid service and of course our own pool. The management company had an on-site office, which could service all our needs. If we didn't feel like cooking, they would happily provide 'room service' or even our own chef to prepare a tasty Thai meal or barbecue. We were a 15-minute taxi ride from evening entertainment

in Chaweng or Lamai, and for the shoppers amongst us nearby Fisherman's Village was the ideal place to try out haggling skills. A vast array of clothes, souvenirs, crafts and of course copy-designer items were on offer, so if your bargaining skills are good enough you can dress head to toe in 'designer' labels for a small price.

Dining out in Koh Samui is an experience in itself. Thai curries are in abundance and some of the finest seafood in the world is available at very reasonable prices. Cliff-top restaurants with views across the Gulf of Thailand can be found, or a romantic candlelit dinner by the lapping sea is not just a dream. We had the most sumptuous seafood set meal on the beach at Fisherman's Village with fresh lobster and huge tiger prawns for only £10 per head. Beware the cost of wine, however, which is imported and therefore expensive. Far better to stick to the local beer or colourful cocktails.

Samui's weather patterns are a little different from the rest of Thailand. In April through September, when most of the country has its monsoon, Samui stays fairly dry, but from October to December it is wet in Samui and drier elsewhere. The driest season is January through March. Diving is spectacular around Koh Samui. The main dive shops are located in Chaweng and trips to Koh Tao or the amazing Ang Thong archipelago dive sites are available. Koh Samui's location is also ideal for 'island hopping', whether on a

trip to the small day picturesque islands nearby or overnight to Krabi, Phi Phi. famous for filming The Beach starring Leonardo DiCaprio, or Ko Pha Ngan. The latter is renowned for its 'Full Moon' parties. The voung-at-heart can take a a 30-minute speedboat trip from Bophut to Ko Pha Ngan, then dance the night away to the sounds of garage and rock music, returning as the sun rises.

Flights to Koh Samui from London are via Bangkok. You can break the journey in the city for a couple of days to visit magnificent

temples or to sample the great shopping on offer. Koh Samui Airport offers one of the most pleasant airport experiences you will ever have. The open-air thatched terminal building is honestly a pleasure to pass through with that typical friendly Thai smile to welcome you. The departure lounge supplies complimentary refreshments and pastries for all passengers, not just those who have paid for an airport VIP lounge.

A typical flight and 7-night 4-star hotel package from Heathrow costs from £950 per person based on two persons sharing a double room including breakfast. Some fantastic offers are available including free night stays, room upgrades and meal options. 



In his mind he could see that soon all the land would be lost to the great tide of humanity who came in search of riches and who, with the connivance of opportunistic businessmen and officials ready to line their own pockets or egos, were riding under the banner of progress and need to provide homes for a new population from across the oceans to the east.


Sound familiar? It is said that there is nothing new under the sun and when I sat on the top of Windmill Hill above the town one evening recently I felt the same pangs of unease as the great war chief of the Lakota/Oglala Sioux must have felt. There beneath me, in the saucer-shaped valley that is our town, a so-called 'hidden gem', I could see evidence of a new wave of activity, as areas around the town were being 'cleared' ready to build more houses to provide necessary homes for people. But what people? Will these homes be for local families or essential workers, or just yet another expedient central government 'initiative' to kick start an ailing economy by succumbing to lobbyist pressure (pass the port Dave, just between friends this evening, nudgenudge know what I mean?)?

After the last war the government then had a real and justifiable reason to build new homes for British people who had fought and suffered in their fight against another attempt to infiltrate our land and way of life. However, that early dream was short-lived when the so-called 'new towns' soon became sprawling masses of humanity with all the inbuilt problems that these enterprises attract.

Successive governments failed to revitalise the large urban areas, concentrating on special developments for the very rich with the effect that inner cities were abandoned to incomers from other lands enticed by the falsehood that here was a better life, where in fact corrupt landlords and inept local governments made matters worse causing the indigenous population to abandon the cities altogether and decamp to the suburbs or even further afield. This so-called 'doughnut' effect only served to draw in more people from foreign climes, accelerated by the expansion of the federalists' dream of a European state.

Now we have an edict from central government to provide more homes, but why and for whom? The County Council, aided and abetted by the EHDC and our own town council's lack of any real concrete (perhaps 'concrete' was a Freudian slip) plans, we are allowing our town to become just another dormitory and dumping ground for any body that the council has a problem with.

The much used and abused consultative process is a waste of time and effort. No real heed will be afforded to the local population's fears and opinions, whilst speculators,



comforted by the assurance that it is the government's will, grab and exploit any spare piece of land, brown field or green, and throw up houses in an orgy of greed not need. But they will not be around to see the damage they have caused, they will be a long way away on some sandy beach or tax haven caring not a jot for the people who have to cope with the extra demands such an explosion will wreak on the town. The warnings of the police will once again be ignored so the criminal damage and nuisance will grow exponentially as the town expands, not to mention the extra pressure placed on services and utilities.

Yes, there will be a PR campaign to say there will be a mixed integrated build plan but the developers, once having outline planning permission in their hot sticky hands, will reapply for a different mix of housing stock in the hope that less affordable builds will line their pockets, and anyway if all else fails the housing associations will always come up with the necessary. So the gravy train rolls on, just like the iron horse that Red Cloud watched but one hundred years ago and if anybody has witnessed what 'manifest destiny' can do to a land then they will know that Red Cloud's fears, like mine, were very real and very justified.

There will always be a need to provide homes for local people, built by local builders living and working in the community, but this unseemly and cynical government approach will only bring long-term problems for our grandchildren to either pay for or run from. Just a thought.

Will the hosepipe ban make us water wise?

Hosepipe bans are now in force across the east and southeast of England. This follows the fifth driest March recorded since 1910. There is a risk of even greater restrictions this summer, but will this make us water wise?

If you are a gardener you'll understand the value of water. You may have connected a water butt to your roof guttering downpipe to collect rainwater. Perhaps you routinely water your garden in the evening and water plants at their base so less of the water evaporates. But when was the last time you thought to water your household plants with your used bath water? The Energy Saving Trust estimates UK households use on average 350 litres of water a day. Most of us could use less. We could, for example:

- · Avoid leaving taps running when washing vegetables and dishes
- Install an aerating shower head (replacing ½ the water with air bubbles)
- Fit a graduated flush device to toilets (to stop flushing 7 litres each use)
