Not surprisingly given all the building proposals around Buntingford, there is rather a lot on planning this month. On the Civic Society page, we reproduce the BCS objection letter to East Herts Council (EHC) concerning Longmead. You'll find many early signposts to Christmas within these pages – details of the Santa Run in support of the Scouts; the Lights of Love Ceremony and Late-Night Shopping evening; the Boxes for Soldiers initiative collecting welcome treats for our serving troops; the first glimpse of the Pantomime; and notices of Christmas carols, bazaars and quizzes. But first, there is Halloween and Bonfire Night to celebrate. The annual Firework Display will be at the Bury on Sunday 4th November (page 46), and Adam Frame, Buntingford PCSO, offers some words of wisdom on staying safe at this time of year (page 47). PLANNING APPLICATION 3/12/1417/RP

On behalf of Buntingford Civic Society I am writing to ask that East Herts District Council refuse to grant permission to proceed with the proposals set out in the above application. Our reasons are as follows:

- 1. The proposals do not comply with policy ENV1 because they do not:
 - demonstrate compatibility with the structure and layout of the surrounding area,
 - relate well to the massing (volume and shape) and height of adjacent buildings,
 - respect the amenity of occupiers of neighbouring buildings and those of future occupants and ensure that their environments are not harmed by noise and disturbance or by inadequate daylight, sunlight or privacy or by overshadowing.
- 2. Because Longmead is narrow and construction traffic will need access to the site (probably by way of Monks Walk), it is important for the developer to show how this is to be achieved safely and without undue disruption to traffic flows especially when children are travelling to and from Millfield School. This the developer fails to do in the submission made.
- 3. There is no Waste or Storm Water management Plan.
- 4. The drawings provided are of a low standard, containing errors and inconsistencies. The Location Plan drawing is out of date; e.g. it does not show the true extent of existing property near the site.



Martin & Mandy - Part 34

Sorry about this – normally I manage to fit a picture or two into our articles, but this month I'm hard pushed to find an appropriate picture, and I need the space for words. I do promise you that normal service will be resumed next month.

Some time ago I asked the conservation officer at the council who was looking after the St Bartholomew's project whose side she was on, and she said to me 'the buildings'. I replied that this was fine as so were we, and we should get on like a house on fire, which is just what has happened. She's helped us along the way and on several occasions I've used her as a bounce board for ideas — she's independent of trades people and so has no interest in one person or another doing work, and she certainly does not care about the cost of an activity, but she definitely has the interests of the building at heart.

Before we started this project you could find people who would tell you tales of woe about listed buildings where English Heritage caused all sorts of trouble. Again this has not been our experience, and the case officer for the project was and still is deeply interested in what we are trying to do, and proved more of a help than a hindrance.

Recent events made me think about this and our experiences of the planning system, and the thing that's made it work for us from the start is that we have considered ourselves merely custodians of the building. OK, we will add a layer of modernity to it – the roof was missing before we started – but we will also add 300+ years to the life expectancy of the building. We have revived Roger Hale and his story, along with all the other personal histories we've been able to bring to light. We have tried not to commit any conservation crimes in the process, and in general I believe we have done well by the building. We have certainly spent more money than any sane people would and we will leave our stamp on the world when we are gone in St Bartholomew's. This is the reason why our experiences with English Heritage and the conservation officer have not matched the rumours in the world; we are basically not a 'Developer'.

The other side of the coin landed on my doormat this week in the shape of a letter from Hertfordshire council about the Hare Street Road development asking us for our comments since we are basically a neighbour to the site. Now let's get one thing out of the way first, turkeys never vote for Christmas and neither do home owners want airports, waste processing plants, oil refineries, supermarkets, sky scrapers or 160 houses next to their homes — and we are no exception to this rule. However, we do accept there is the need for growth as the population is growing, and this requires houses, but I'd like it to be part of a planned process.

The thing that's missing at the moment in Buntingford is a county-wide plan for housing and a Buntingford plan for development, both these I understand are in hand and due for publication. However, in the meantime Buntingford has already seen the development opposite the Sainsbury depot of Kingfisher Park, this was in the region of 150 homes, a fair chunk of which are still under construction, with a number of those already completed remaining unsold. It's a large development of houses one on top of another and driven by a developer who's frankly in it for the money and who has tried to get as many houses in as possible. Whenever I drive past I can't but help think of Pottersville from the film It's a Wonderful Life, where Henry Potter's aspirations of densely packed but profitable (for him) housing is imagined, rather than the idyllic world of Bedford Falls and the long-suffering George Bailey. In the film Potter's nemesis is George Bailey who runs the

Building and Loan savings company, which provides comfortable houses for the benefit of the community, as part of a plan for the community – most certainly not for profit, and it's a striking difference in the end result that's portrayed.

Another example of this is the Railway Inn site, where 8 little houses are being crammed into a tiny site, each having a garden barely the size of a family car from what I can see. Thank goodness there's countryside in walking distance – for now.

The Hare Street Road proposal is from a different developer to Kingfisher Park, or the Railway Inn site, but the principle is identical, trying to get in quick on the planning angle before the release of a town or county plan which may block their scheme.

As I mentioned, turkeys don't vote for Christmas and I accept the need for more housing but I really cannot understand why this is not being accomplished once a plan has been created for Buntingford, rather than simply letting random developers pick off parts of the Town that they have access to because people are prepared to sell. To those that say there's an immediate need ... not so! If there were an immediate need then the Kingfisher Park development would have been sold long ago, and that's not happened.

We all have a chance here to influence the world we live in; Mandy & I are lucky enough to be able to do our bit in helping some of our history survive, but we can all voice our views on the way our Town grows. I want to live and retire in Bedford Falls (aka Buntingford) and not in Pottersville (the result of developers circling ready for the kill) and if you feel the same way I'd urge you to look at the Hare Street Road proposal (either on the website or at the Manor House) and object to it before it's too late (Nov 8th). Write to Hazel Izod, the planning officer for development at East Herts Council planning department quoting application number 3/12/1657/FP, and to Councillors Surjit Basra & Stan Bull at the Manor House in Buntingford and make your feelings known.

It's not constructive to object to all housing development in Buntingford, remember we are all like turkeys on this one, but it is sensible to object to housing that does not benefit the town, merely provides profit for a company who have no care for an overall design. Far better to produce a plan that covers the Town's growth over the coming years and then allow developers to produce the houses that provide us with a coherent and functioning town, rather than a patchwork of homes scattered across the area, causing congestion and overcrowded spots, which will just line the pockets of people who don't even live in Buntingford.

Rant over, but please think about acting on this topic, as Hare Street Road might not be the right place for new development. Next month we will introduce you to the Green Man!! Sounds scary, but we are firmly back on track with a stunningly nice act from a person who we had never met till a few weeks ago.

Memories of Buckland Village Life – Part 3

A Response from Sandra's 'long-suffering' brother

As usual, my sister Sandra got it all wrong. Ernie Bailey showed his plunge pack, which he developed with British Visqueen (a subsidiary of ICI), at a packaging exhibition at Alexandra Palace in London. He didn't patent it but somebody who picked his brains there did. He was a very inventive man and I spent many hours helping in his workshop. We built a machine to hold the polythene bag open while it was filled automatically and then check-weighed and sealed. This was in 1950 – a man ahead of his time.

Ernie was one of the first in the country to do prepacked fruit and vegetables. He had two depots in London, one in Wood Green and one in Kensington, and from there the prepacks were delivered to customers using ex-milk floats. I ran the packaging plant with the help of several ladies (what a job for a 17-year-old!). I remember two Buntingford ladies working there, Flo Pledger and Mary Smith, as well as Janet Shepherd and Eunice Lamb from Reed, and my Mum to keep an eye on me. We had some good times. Ernie also bred chickens which were plucked and cleaned 'table-ready' for John Lewis by the same gang of ladies. And he had one of the first farm shops just outside Buckland.

I passed my driving test in one of Mr Bailey's lorries and at 17, the day I passed, was told 'there's a lorry, you're in Covent Garden tonight'. He had his own stand in the Jubilee market – it was at the back, so you had to be there for midnight when the gates opened to get to it. Once in, your lorry was unloaded and the stuff sold, then it was reloaded with what had been bought for delivery all over London before coming home. No limited hours in those days, or HGV licences, and so started my driving career.

His farm was also home to some cottage industries. In a corrugated tin garage at the top of the yard John Tojero built racing cars. Famous for the 'Tojero Jaguar', John did a lot of development work on the monocoque chassis and also designed the Berkley Bandit. There was a car upholsterer, Archie Allen. Buntingford people might remember him and his band 'The Beverly Boys' playing at dances in the hall at the back of The Chequers (now Brambles) at the top of the High Street. Also run from there was Buckland Body Works, which built lorry bodies and cabs and also, under licence, the 'AC Buckland Tourer' and the 'AC Petite', a three-wheeler with one model that was an invalid car.

There were two other farms in Buckland, both run by two Mr Hodges, and the boys in the village all worked for one or the other. Milking the cows and cleaning out the cowsheds was okay unless you happened to be behind one when it coughed! Weekends during the winter we got to drive the tractor and went stoning (clearing stones from the fields), and also pulling and trimming mangolds (a sort of beet) for cattle food. At harvest we would double-stack two and a quarter hundredweight sacks of corn on our backs and we got to drive the combine while the men had their tea. Health and Safety would have had a field day. The reward for all this? Twelve shillings and six pence, or 52.5p in new money.

I can just remember, as a child, the winter of 1947. The men from the village cut the snow from the road north of Buckland and put it over the bridge into the river between Chipping and Parkside. The winter of 1963 was much different. I was working in Royston and had to walk to work during that winter: no taking a day off – no work no pay. Lorries got stuck on the hill coming out of Chipping and the villagers took supplies to the drivers, who were burning old bits off the lorries to keep warm (lorries didn't have heaters in those days). I started work in Royston when I left school at 15, working for Fred Heasel winding electric motors five and a half days a week. I biked 4 miles each way and worked 44 hours for

44 shillings (£1.80p). How many kids nowadays would do that? I had to work, as the 'bank of mum and dad' was non-existent in those days. I lasted a year then went back to work for Mr Bailey until I was 20. But they were good times to grow up in. So you want to be your own boss?

There always seem to be programmes on television lately on how to be your own boss and what you can achieve with only a small amount of start-up investment. Problems with Booking Online

My son bought a festival ticket online. It wasn't the official website and I'm a bit concerned that he may have been sold a fake. How can I tell if it is a counterfeit and what can we do about it?

There are a few ways to check if your son has bought a ticket from a safe website. Check to see if the site has a red, black and white kitemark provided by the Society of Ticket Agents and Retailers (STAR) www.star.org.uk with the words 'secure tickets from authorised retailers' as this will help you identify it if is a legitimate website. If you are still unsure you could contact the Association of Secondary Ticket Agents (ASTA) www.asta-uk.org to see if they know if the site you are looking at is genuine or not. You could also contact the official website and explain the situation – they may be able to check the serial numbers of the tickets.

After this, if you think your son's ticket is from a scam website, you should report it to the police and also action fraud website, at **www.actionfraud.police.uk**. You may not get his money back, but you can try to prevent the site being used by others.

If he paid for the ticket by credit card, the credit card company may be jointly responsible if the ticket seller breaks their contract with you. As long as the ticket cost over £100, you may be able to claim your money back from the credit card company. If he paid by a Visa or Mastercard debit card, you may be able to ask for a refund under their **chargeback** scheme. You will need to contact the card company to make a claim.

I've recently booked a holiday online. I booked the flights one day and the hotel the next morning but both through the same website. Now the hotel has gone bust and I'm struggling to find a suitable alternative. What can I do?

The company you booked your hotel and flight with, even if it is just an online company, might be responsible for sorting this out – depending on how long it was between when you booked the flights and hotel. If it was within 24 hours you will be covered. So in this instance, the company needs to either offer an alternative hotel of the same price or provide a full refund for everything you booked with them.

That's because in April this year Flight-Plus holidays (this is when you book a holiday through a company where you buy the flights, accommodation or car hire separately from them but all within 24 hours of each other) are now covered under the ATOL (Air Travel Organisers Licence) scheme. That means if the company you booked through or the airline, hotel or car hire company goes bust – either before you go on holiday or during your trip – it is up to the company to sort it out for you.

Celebrating Great Results

It has been a really positive start to the new academic year at Freman College. The summer holidays brought well earned and richly deserved exam success to our A level students and also last year's E years (Year 11). A greater proportion of our students achieved A* and A grades at A level

than ever before: a quarter of all A level grades achieved by students were A* or A, while 54% were grades A*–B. More than 10% of the year group achieved 3 or more A or A* grades and almost without exception students are now embarking on the next career step that they had hoped to, whether to university, college, work, or a gap year.

Meanwhile a new college record was set by last year's E Year with students achieving a higher average GCSE point score per student than ever before, despite results falling overall nationally. The average point score per student was 504, which means on average students achieved the equivalent of over 9 GCSE A grades. Of the 206 students taking their GCSEs this year, 91% achieved 5 or more A*–C grades and 65% per cent of students achieved 5 or more A*–C grades including English and mathematics. With 100% of students passing at least 5 GCSEs, another record result, students of all abilities shared in the college's success.

We could not be prouder of the success of our students this summer. They worked really hard to achieve the fantastic results they did and in the case of GCSE students, did so despite the fact that, as has been widely covered in the media, in some subjects the grade boundaries had been raised without any warning.

To add to the college's sense of achievement, our I Year boys' football team (right) covered themselves in glory, bringing home the Under 14 County Cup, having patiently waited for the rescheduled final after it was rained off at the end of last term. In a superb match they beat Roundwood Park 2:1, scoring the winning goal in extra time.

It has also been great to return to college with the prospect of a new Sports Hall a step closer to reality. By careful budgeting and also successful bids, we have



secured the funding to build a four-court sports hall with changing rooms, space for a fitness suite and also four classrooms. Our application for planning permission for the £1.1 million project has been submitted and we are waiting with bated breath. The Sports Hall will be at the northern end of the school buildings on what is currently wasteland, so will not reduce the amount of playing fields we currently have but will add much needed indoor PE space to our facilities. We plan to make the Sports Hall available for let to local groups and anticipate that it will be ready for use by September 2013. It will be great to watch the building take shape over the coming months.



One is minded to speculate if its introduction was orchestrated by retail giants greedy to exploit the insatiable appetite for the retail consumer. But children enjoy it, so perhaps we shouldn't be cynical.

For me I remember with affection the days of yore when children



built bonfires (unsupervised) and father's old trousers were hijacked for the guy for whom we begged 'penny for the guy mister' to buy fireworks. In the days following the 5th November the central grass area and tarmac of the road on our estate, destroyed by the bonfire, was repaired by the council without whining about 'budgetary allocation' or accompanied by heaps of forms or interfering Elf and Safety Gestapo.

Obviously and tragically there were accidents as a few members of the public went off piste. However, there were reputable companies ensuring that if fireworks were handled correctly then you would be very unlucky to suffer any damage to the person. Whatever happened to Brock Fireworks? And who controls these current imported pyrotechnic creations which have the ferocity of a small arsenal, now favoured by those who have more money than sense and wish to impress their neighbours!

But when the rocket sticks are swept away and the last of the pumpkin lanterns are condemned to the brown bin, lady autumn spreads the folds of her cloak across mist-laden meadows where cows seem to float in the golden haze of morning. These are truly uplifting moments to be enjoyed before the cold winds come in with the winter solstice and the woodcock, heralding dark days and snow.
